Highlights from the meeting:

- A **budget motion** was sent to members via the March newsletter for vote at the March meeting. Members were informed that the club's HVAC system must be replaced so several members spoke against the motion that would give additional funds to the CSPs and \$500 to My Kids Club. The motion was voted down.
- The following **officers were duly elected to serve during** the 2022-2024 administrative term: President, Betsy Grannis; 1st Vice President, Trish Perna; 2nd Vice President, Brenda Hill; Treasurer, Judy Ryan; Recording Secretary, Loretta Mascia; Corresponding Secretary, Patty Jo Johnson. Installation will be held at

- Judy Ryan and Loretta Mascia, co-chairs for the **Small Town Gala**, reported on Gala activities and encouraged members to continue selling tickets. They also encouraged members to support the businesses of the many sponsors.
- **8 District Chair**, Rachel Masimore, announced that all of the TWCC club-woman award winners will be going to GFWC-NC for consideration at the state level. Also, the TWCC winner of the Sallie Southall Cotten Scholarship was selected at District and will go to GFWC-NC.
- The **State Art Festival** will be held on March 12th in Mebane and the student and Clubwoman award winners will compete at State. Peggy Earp announced that for the **State Literature awards**, Sarah Brooks won for Short Story and Peggy won for Poetry. Both of these will now compete at national.
- TWCC member **Gracie Chamblee** sent a request for assistance for some students graduating from **SSS High School**. They need financial assistance to pay for caps and gowns and tickets to the prom. The request went through members participating in **Silent Partners**. More than \$500 was raised for this worthy cause. A sign up sheet for Silent Partners was available for members who want to contribute in the future (no more than \$25/year).

The Education CSP has taken on a new project sponsored by **Serve the Need in Johnston County**. The following is from their April newsletter:

"Project Celebrate" will celebrate teachers this school year (2021-2022) by giving ten \$25 Visa gift cards to ten (10) Title I schools, totaling 100 gift cards. We recognize that all schools, teachers, and support staff make an incredible impact in the lives of our youth. However, as an initial effort, we have selected 10 Title I schools because of their additional work in educating students from disadvantaged areas, hence the job requires so much more of teachers.

Serve the Need in Johnston County would match the funds (dollar for dollar) that it receives.

The committee would then purchase the 100 Visa gift cards in May in order to take them to the following Title I schools prior to the end of this school year. Visa gift cards were chosen because of their use nearly everywhere and its use is not limited to a particular product or store.

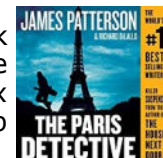

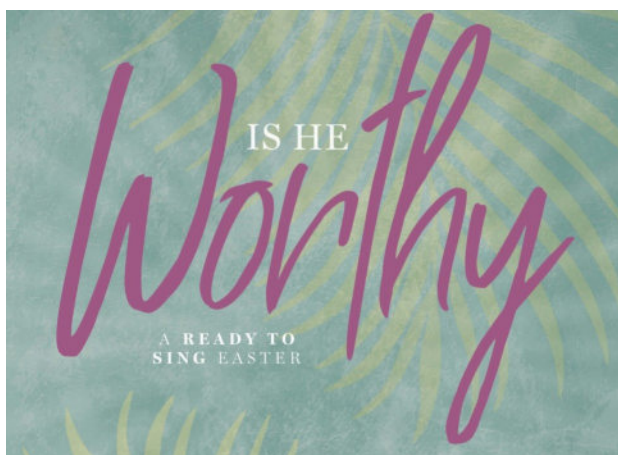
TWCC Bunco

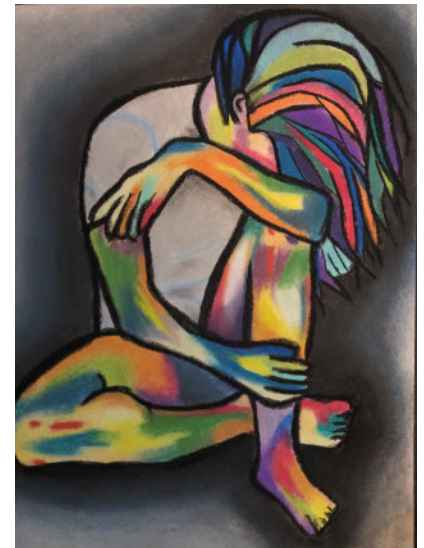
Sarah Brooks and Peggy Earp submitted **literature entries** that will now move on to our National organization for judging at that level. Congratulations to these ladies.

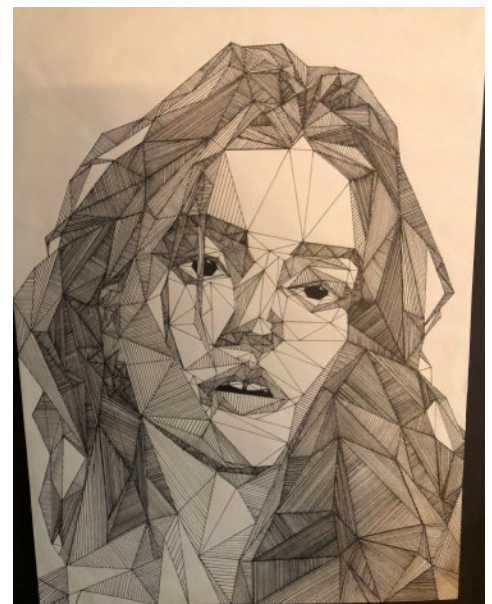

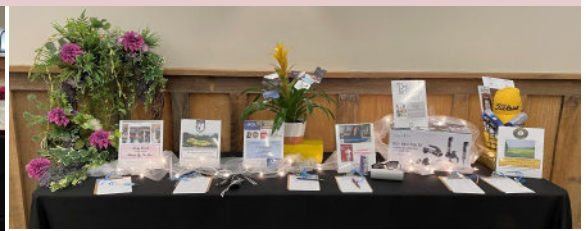

Olive Garden Chicken Marsala

Ingredients

4 chicken breasts, boneless & skinless
1/2 cup flour
Salt to taste
Pepper to taste
Dried oregano to taste
4 Tbsp oil
4 Tbsp butter or margarine
2 cups fresh mushrooms, sliced
1 cup Marsala wine



Instructions

1. **POUND** chicken breasts between sheets of plastic wrap until about 1/4" thickness.
2. **COMBINE** flour, salt, pepper and oregano in a mixing bowl. Dredge chicken pieces in the flour, shaking off any excess.
3. **HEAT** oil and butter in a skillet over medium heat. Cook chicken breasts on medium heat for about 2 minutes on the first side, until lightly browned. Turn breasts over to cook other side, then add mushrooms to skillet. Cook breasts about 2 more minutes, until both sides are lightly browned. Continue to stir mushrooms. Add Marsala wine around chicken pieces.
4. **COVER** and simmer for about 15 minutes.
5. **TRANSFER** to serving plate.

Baked Spaghetti

Ingredients

12 oz spaghetti
1, 28 oz jar prepared spaghetti sauce
1 lb. ground beef, lean
1/2 c diced green pepper
1/2 c diced onions
1/2 c grated carrots
1 tsp Italian seasoning
1 clove garlic, minced
8 oz cream cheese
1/2 c parmesan cheese, grated
1 c mozzarella cheese, shredded









Instructions

1. Cook spaghetti noodles according to directions on packet and drain. Add cream cheese while noodles are hot and mix thoroughly.
2. Next, brown the ground beef, green peppers, onions, grated carrots, garlic and seasoning in pan. Drain, put back into pan and stir in spaghetti sauce.
3. In a Pyrex 9 x 13 baking dish spray lightly and spread a small amount of hamburger mixture on bottom. Next put spaghetti on top of sauce and then add rest of hamburger mixture. Sprinkle your parmesan cheese and then mozzarella cheese. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes until bubbly.

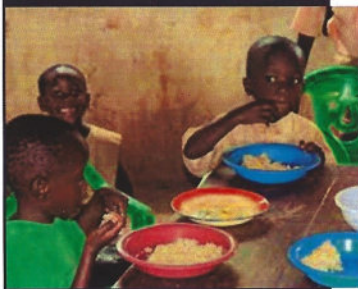

KNOW YOUR NO'S

Don't tangle or contaminate. Recycle right for our state!



No bagged recyclables
(keep them loose and free)



No tanglers
(cords, hoses, wires, etc. tangle in the machinery)



No small/shredded paper and packaging
(small things are hard to sort)



No cups, no lids, no straws
(can't be sorted by the machines)



No Styrofoam
(crumbles in the machinery)



No paper towels or napkins
(often soiled and too thin to recycle)



No household or car batteries
(contain hazardous materials)



No scrap metal
(harms the machinery)



No pumps or tubes
(made of multiple materials that can't be separated for recycling)



No plastic wraps, pillows or bags
(tangles in the machinery)



No textiles
(take to the thrift store)



No household glass, mirrors or ceramics
(can't be remanufactured)



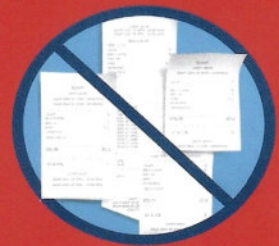
No aerosol cans

No receipts
(can contain non-recyclable layers and chemicals)
