

Recipe Corner—Christmas



Beef Stick

INGREDIENTS

2 lb. ground chuck - 80% lean

2 T Tender Quick Salt (probably need to get from food specialty store)

1/4 tsp onion powder

½ tsp garlic salt

1 cup water

1 ½ tsp Hickory Liquid Smoke

1 T Mustard Seed

1 T coarsely ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

Mix well and roll into 5 rolls (silver dollar size). Use 1 C of meat per roll. Wrap in Saran Wrap and then foil (air tight). Refrigerate 24 hours. Unwrap and bake in broiler pan for 1 hour at 300 degrees. It is important to place beef stick on broiler rack. If just placed in pan it will get hard. Turn beef stick over after 30 minutes. Freezes well up to 3-4 months.

Yields 5 Beef Sticks



Ingredients

1 lb. Neese's Liver Pudding

1/4 Cup Sour Cream

2 T. Chives (or onions)

2 T. Parsley

1 small clove garlic, minced

Dash, Cayenne Pepper

1/4 tsp. Thyme and Savory or Allspice and Nutmeg

2 T. Brandy, Cognac or Sherry

Instructions

Cut liver pudding into 6 or more pieces and place in food processor with sour cream. Mix thoroughly. Add chives, parsley, cayenne, spices and brandy and process until blended thoroughly. Store in a crock or jar. Serve in decorative bowl for canapé spread, accompanied by crackers. Will keep at least 2 weeks in refrigerator.

Cranberry Christmas Cake

Ingredients

3 eggs

2 cups sugar

3/4 cup butter, softened

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups all-purpose flour * see note below for gluten-free alternative

12 oz fresh cranberries

Instructions

1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.

With a mixer, beat the eggs with the sugar until slightly thickened and light in color, about 5-7 minutes. The mixture should almost double in size. The eggs work as your leavening agent in this recipe, so do not skip this step. This mixture should form a ribbon when you lift the beaters out of the bowl.

3. Add the butter and vanilla; mix two more minutes.

4. Stir in the flour until just combined.

5. Add the cranberries and stir to mix throughout.

6. Spread in a buttered 9×13 pan. (This pan is my favorite!) Bake for 40-50 minutes, or until very lightly browned and a toothpick inserted near the center of the cake comes out clean. (I baked mine for 43 minutes.)

7. Let cool completely before cutting into small slices. I cut mine into fairly small pieces, about 1"x2", so that they could be easily eaten at a party. Enjoy

Cajun-Style Potato Skins



PER SERVING

PREP: 15 MIN I COOK: 8 MIN I Serves 4

Planning a big Super Bowl party? Triple this crowd-pleasing recipe. Your guests will be thrilled, and they'll never know you cut the POINTS values.

1 spray cooking spray

- 2 large potatoes, baked, cooled completely, and cut in half lengthwise* 1/4 cup smoky barbecue sauce 1/8 tsp hot pepper sauce
- ♦ ¾ cup cooked chicken breast, finely chopped or shredded ¼ cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese ½ tsp fresh parsley, chopped, for garnish

Preheat oven to 425°F. Coat a baking sheet with cooking spray.

Scoop half of the potato flesh out of each potato half (reserve for soup or mashed potatoes). Combine barbecue sauce and hot pepper sauce in a cup, and spoon over potato halves. Fill each potato half with 3 Tbsp of chicken; sprinkle each with 1 Tbsp of cheese.

Carefully place potato skins on prepared baking sheet. Bake until cheese melts and potatoes are hot, about 8 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley and serve. Yields 1 potato half per serving.

*Make sure the potatoes are cooled completely before slicing and scooping out the flesh, or you may have a hard time forming the skins.

GOOD IDEA: For a zesty alternative, substitute ¼ cup of hot-and-spicy ketchup for a combination of smoky barbecue sauce and hot red pepper sauce.

Water Saving Habits

- *Turn off the water while brushing your teeth
- *Use a water bottle: the manufacturing of bottled water uses 7x the amount of water in the bottle.
- *Check your toilet for leaks
- *Put a plastic water bottle full of sand in your toilet tank: saves 5 gals. of water per day
- *Turn off the hose while washing your car
- *Take shorter showers: each minute of a shower uses 5-10 gals of water
- *Run only full loads of both the washing machine and the dishwasher
- *Water outdoor plants in the early morning or evening
- *Deep soak your lawn: light sprinkling simply evaporates
- *Mulch your outdoor plants
- *Use a broom to clean driveways and sidewalks
- *Use a rain barrel to collect water for your planrs
- *Put aerators on your faucets
- *Use a soil moisture meter on your plants
- *Wash your car on the lawn
- *Install drip irrigation

FYI

- *The average household uses 350 gals of water per day
- *By using water saving techniques, you can reduce water usage by 35%
- *75% of household water used indoors is in the bathroom and 25% of that is for the toilet
