Conservation CSP

Force Early Blooms

In all but the warmest parts of the South, celebrate spring early by bringing branches of flowering shrubs and trees inside to force the blooms.

Cut stems of redbud, flowering pear, serviceberry, magnolia, flowering quince, or any of your favorite spring bloomers. Create unusual arrangements with stems of plants that bear catkins. This includes *Corylus* shrubs and alder and birch trees.



Once you bring the branches inside, submerge and recut stem ends under water. Plunge freshly cut ends in a clean bucket filled with floral preservative. Place the branch-filled bucket in a cool spot, such as a garage or porch. Allow stems to fully hydrate; it will only take a few hours.

Use the stems to create spectacular indoor arrangements. Fill vases with floral preservative solution to keep bacteria at bay. Change the solution weekly or whenever it's cloudy. Add the cut stems, and watch buds swell and burst into bloom.

Medicine Bottle

Chair: Laurie Partlo

Recycling The Conservation CSP is collecting empty plastic pill bottles for Matthew 25: Ministries (m25m.org). We ac*cept* donations of empty plastic pill bottles for inclusion in shipments of medical supplies and for shredding and recycling. Their pill bottle proaram fulfills the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for our environment.



Acceptable collection items include:

- Prescription and over-the-counter pill bottles
- Large and small pill bottles
- Pill Bottles with and without secure caps (child resistant)

Pill bottles that are not appropriate to include with shipments of medical supplies are





recycled for cash that goes towards Matthew 25: Ministries' programs.

If you wish to prepare bottles for shipment rather than recycling, please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Bottles included in shipments of medical supplies must have an all plastic lid.
- Remove labels, leaving no glue or residue.
- Wash bottles in very hot water and dish soap.
- Rinse and dry thoroughly.
- Replace lids on clean, dried bottles.
- Place clean, recapped bottles in ziplock bags marked "Clean Bottles." These will be blended with medical supplies. <u>Unbagged</u> bottles will be recycled.

We would also like to encourage you to dispose of your old medications at the Clayton Police Department. There is a collection box. These can be any type of medications (prescription, over-the -counter, liquid, pill, etc.).

Please don't flush your medications!

This fund is raising awareness through television, radio and print to alert us to be aware of children in distress and report concerns. Signs a child is being trafficked:

- Knows little about whereabouts
- Works excessively long hours
- Exhibits fear or anxious behavior
- Hired with false pretenses
- Has inconsistencies in his or her story

Hotline to call: <u>888-373-7888</u>. Text info or help to Be Free (233733). Also buying fair trade labelled products, such as chocolate, coffee and sugar, helps in the fight against child labor. (There are over 1000 items listed at fairtrade.USA.org.

Donations to this fight to End Trafficking may be made at UNICEF USA.org/ EndTrafficking. To help support this program the Night 'N Gals have voted to donate \$200 to this fund.

Recipe Corner

Baked Spaghetti

"A comforting baked spaghetti casserole with plenty of melted cheese is the perfect dish for potlucks, family gatherings, or a week-night dinner."

Prep 25 min; Cook 1 hour; Ready in 1 hr, 25 min

Ingredients

- 1 (16 ounce) package spaghetti
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 (32 ounce) jar meatless spaghetti sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 2 eggs
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 5 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 cups small curd cottage cheese, divided
- 4 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.
- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook spaghetti in boiling water, stirring occasionally until cooked through but firm to the bite, about 12 minutes. Drain.
- 3. Heat a large skillet over medium heat; cook and stir beef and onion until meat is browned and onions are soft and translucent, about 7 minutes. Drain. Stir in spaghetti sauce and seasoned salt.
- 4. Whisk eggs, Parmesan cheese, and butter in a large bowl. Mix in spaghetti to egg mixture and toss to coat. Place half the spaghetti mixture into baking dish. Top with half the cottage cheese, mozzarella, and meat sauce. Repeat layers. Cover with aluminum foil.
- 5. Bake in preheated oven for 40 minutes. Remove foil and continue to bake until the cheese is melted and lightly browned, 20 to 25 minutes longer. Recipe from Allrecipes
