## Spring Fling Brunch & Fashion Event Fundraiser



## **Recipe Corner—Cookies**



#### **Raspberry Almond Kiss Cookies**

**Ingredients** 

1/2 cup butter, softened

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon almond extract

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup white sugar for decoration

40 milk chocolate candy kisses, unwrapped

1 cup confectioners' sugar

1 tablespoon milk

4 teaspoons raspberry jam

1/4 teaspoon almond extract

#### **Directions**

- In a medium bowl, cream together the butter, 1/2 cup white sugar and brown sugar until smooth. blend in the egg and 1 teaspoon almond extract. Combine the flour, baking soda and salt; stir into the creamed mixture. Cover dough and refrigerate for at least one hour, or until easy to handle.
- Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Roll dough into 1 inch balls, roll the balls in the remaining white sugar and place them 2 inches apart onto ungreased cookie sheets.
- Bake for 10 to 12 minutes in the preheated oven, or until golden brown.
   While hot from the oven, immediately press a chocolate kiss into the center of each one. Remove from cookie sheets to cool on wire racks.
- In a small bowl, mix together the confectioners' sugar, milk, raspberry jam and 1/4 teaspoon almond extract until smooth. Drizzle over cooled cookies.

Prep—30 min; Cook—10 min; Ready In—42 min

#### **Butter Almond Crescents**

#### **Ingredients**

2 sticks unsalted butter, softened 1 cup Confectioner's Sugar, divided 1 tsp almond extract

2 cups all purpose Flour

1 cup finely chopped almonds

#### **Directions**

- $\bullet \text{In a large bowl, beat butter with } 1/2 \ \text{cup sugar until light and fluffy.} \ \text{Blend in almond extract.}$
- •Sift flour and gradually add to mixture, along with almonds. Blend together until it forms a dough.
- •Shape dough into a ball, seal in plastic wrap, and refrigerate at least 1 hour.
- •Heat oven to 350 degrees.
- •Divide dough into 8 pieces. Lightly flour hands and work surface. Shape each piece into a ½ inch thick roll. Cut each roll into 2-inch pieces.
- •Arrange on ungreased cookie sheets and shape each into a crescent, tapering the ends by gently pinching them.
- •Bake 18-20 minutes or until faintly brown. When cookies are completely cooled, dust tops with sifted remaining sugar. Store in airtight container.
