Heart Attack Warning Signs

Some heart attacks are sudden and intense, but most of them start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Here are signs that can mean a heart attack is happening:

- Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.
- · Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- Shortness of breath. This feeling often comes along with chest discomfort. But it can also occur without chest discomfort.
- Other signs may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

If you or someone you're with has one or more of these signs, call 9-1-1 immediately. Get to the hospital right away.

If you're the one having symptoms, and you can't access the emergency medical services (EMS), have someone drive you to the hospital right away. Don't drive yourself, unless you have absolutely no other option.





Recipe Corner—Appetizers

Holiday Chicken Salad

Ingredients

3 cups cooked shredded chicken 3/4 cup Mayonnaise 3/4 cup chopped celery 3/4 cup chopped pecans 1/2 cup dried sweetened cranberries Salt & Pepper to taste Optional: Bell Pepper and Green Onions

Instructions:

- Mix all ingredients together.
- Refrigerate 1 hour before serving.

Ingredients

- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 2 cups sour cream
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 6 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 1/2 cup sliced green onion

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 400 F.
- Combine softened cream cheese, sour cream, cheddar cheese, bacon and green onion.

Baked Cheese Dip

Spoon mixture into a 1-quart baking dish and bake for 25-30 minutes, or until cheese is bubbling and hot.

Candied Pecans


Serve with bread slices, crackers, or veggies.

Ingredients

2¹/₂ cups pecans, halved 1/4 cup (50g) brown sugar 1/4 cup (85g) honey 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt 2 tablespoons butter, melted

Instructions:

- In a large bowl, mix together the pecans, brown sugar, honey, salt, and melted butter. The pecan halves should be well coated.
- Spread the coated pecans evenly on the lined baking sheet. Bake for 20 minutes, stirring them at the 10 and 15-minute mark. (The pecans are done cooking when they are a deep brown color.)
- Remove from the oven. Stir the pecans, spreading them out. Let cool completely before serving. (If the pecans are not crunchy enough, simply put them back in the oven to bake longer.)





1 1/2 oz. sliced pepperoni 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives

Greek Feta Dip Phyllo Cups

Ingredients 1/8 tsp dried Basil

1/8 tsp Garlic Powder Lee, these light and crispy 3 T Green Onion/Scallions

1/2 cup Tomato

1 Squeeze Lemon Juice Pinch of Salt & Pepper

- 1 1/2 T Olive Oil, Extra Virgin 1/3 cup Feta Cheese
- 15 Phyllo Shells (one package)

Instructions:

- Mix first 8 ingredients. Spoon mixture evenly into phyllo shells. •
- Yield: 15 appetizer servings.

Hot Cheese Dip

2 cups (8oz.) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese 2 cups (8oz,) shredded cheddar cheese 1 can (4oz.) chopped green chiles, drained Rye chips, assorted crackers or assorted fresh vegetables









Diagonally cut bread as shown, but not clear through

Mix and heat all remaining ingredients till onion is soft
