Enjoyable too!! I have a bag of packaged food on my pantry shelf to remind me often of the hunger in our world.

The service of others has always been a part of my life. It is who I am.

Ingredients

4 parts ABSOLUT CITRON 2 parts Orange Liqueur 1 part Cranberry Juice 1 dash Lime Juice Lime Wedge

Instructions

Shake with ice and strain into a well-chilled cocktail glass. Garnish with a lime wedge.

Apple-Goat Cheese Crostini with Maple Syrup

INGREDIENTS

Baguette—sliced into 1/4 inch thick slices 2 Granny Smith Apples, peeled and thinly sliced 2 T butter Lemon Juice Maple Syrup Cinnamon Goat Cheese



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Brush both sides of baguette slices with olive oil. Arrange slices on a baking sheet and bake in 375 degree oven for 12-15 minutes, or until golden. Let cool.
- Sauté sliced apples in the butter, a squeeze of lemon juice, and maple syrup and cinnamon to taste.
- 3. Just before serving, slather the crostini with goat cheese. Arrange on platter and spoon on the warm apples.

Blueberry-Orange Salad

Ingredients

Mesclun greens, washed and dried 1 Large Orange (remove peel, pith, membrane and seeds) Blueberries, washed and dried

Dressing:

- 1 Large Orange (zested and juiced)
- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 clove garlic, peeled and smashed

34 cup extra virgin olive oil

Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

Instructions

- 1. In a blender, combine the orange zest, orange juice, balsamic vinegar, honey, and garlic. Blend until smooth. With the blender running, add the olive oil in a steady stream until combined. Add salt & pepper to taste. Transfer to a lidded container and store in the refrigerator.
- 2. In a large salad bowl, combine mesclun greens, fresh orange segments, and blueberries. Toss with a small amount of the dressing to lightly coat.

Grilled Steak with Blue Cheese Potatoes

Ingredients

3 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped 3 tablespoons coarsely chopped fresh rosemary, plus sprigs for garnish 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil, plus more for brushing Freshly ground pepper

1 3/4 pounds skirt steak

1 1/2 pounds small red potatoes Coarse salt 3 ounces blue cheese, crumbled

Instructions

- 1. Preheat grill to high. Stir garlic, rosemary, Worcestershire sauce, and oil in a nonreactive dish; season with pepper. Place steak in dish, cutting to fit if necessary; coat both sides with marinade. Marinate, turning once, 15 minutes, or up to overnight in the refrigerator.
- Cover potatoes with cold water in a medium saucepan; add a pinch of salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, and simmer until just tender, about 15 minutes. Drain; let cool slightly. Slice potatoes in half, and brush lightly with oil; season with salt and pepper.
- 3. Grill steak, turning once, to desired doneness, 3 to 4 minutes per side for medium-rare. Set aside. Meanwhile, grill potatoes, turning once, until lightly browned, about 5 minutes. Immediately sprinkle with cheese. Thinly slice steak against grain. Divide steak and potatoes among 4 plates. Serve, garnished with rosemary sprigs.

Serves 4

Chocolate Rum Dessert

Ingredients

1 Goz. package of semisweet chocolate morsels 3 eggs, separated 2 T Light Rum 1/4 tsp almond extract 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg Whipped Cream Chocolate Curls (optional)



Instructions

- 1. Melt chocolate over hot water in top of double boiler.
- 2. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually stir about 1/4 of chocolate into yolks; add remaining chocolate, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in rum, almond extract and nutmeg.
- 3. Beat egg whites (at room temperature) until stiff peaks form; gently fold into chocolate mixture. Spoon into cordial glasses or demitasse cups. Chill.
- 4. Before serving, top with whipped cream and chocolate curls.

Yield: 4 servings
