The program began with Becky Stewart reading a Christmas story that reinforced the true meaning of Christmas. This was followed by Sandy Nesselrode reading a wonderfully humorous poem she pinned, "Have You Seen Santa". The poem is included at the end of the newsletter.

Mary Sinzdak introduced 5 guests.

Other items covered in the meeting:

- Susan Quinn read a letter from GFWC recognizing TWCC's 100th anniversary. A copy of the certificate is at the end of the newsletter.
- Thomas Lipscomb and Rachel Masimore reviewed the awards won for the gingerbread decorations in the Main Street Community Garden—Facebook award for People's Choice and Most Creative decorations presented by the Town of Clayton.
- The Public Issues CSP sponsored a tree for the Donate Life NC Festival of Trees. The tree, decorated by Teresa Mathis and Brenda Hill, won the award for "Most Whimsical Tree" and was auctioned off for \$80.
- The Taste of Carolina Cuisine final report was given by co-chairs Sunday Penny and Dianne Carroll. \$16,304 net was raised. There were a few gift cards remaining and those were auctioned off by Bree Rude and Brenda Hill (pictured below).



- Susan Quinn and Rachel Masimore thanked members that shopped for 50 Christmas Kids and 5 Senior Wishes.
- During the Clayton Civitan's Reverse Raffle Fundraiser, the Civitan sponsor a 50/50 raffle and a live auction.

The money raised from these events are donated to The Woman's Club of Clayton to help with their "Christmas Kids" program. Angela Williams presented a check for \$3000 from the Civitan Club. In addition, she presented \$140 in cash donated individually by a Civitan member and \$150 from New Hope Wilders Grove. These funds and funds from TWCC were used to purchase 50 children gifts spending \$100 for each child.

- Give courteous attention during club meetings.
- Avoid discussing the club business outside meetings.
- Remain until the meeting is declared adjourned by the chairman.
- Refrain from criticism of speakers and of members who have accepted responsibility.
- Offer only constructive criticism.
- Learn and practice parliamentary procedure.
- Enjoy your membership with enthusiasm.

Recipe Corner

Eggplant Parmigiana

Ingredients

2 teaspoons olive oil, divided

1/2 cup each chopped onion and green bell pepper

1 15oz. can petite diced tomatoes

1/2 teaspoon oregano

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

Dash pepper

1 medium eggplant, peel and cut crosswise into 8 rounds

(about 1/2 inch thick)

2 oz each grated Parmesan and shredded Mozzarella cheese (I use about 4 oz of each)



In 1-quart saucepan heat 1 teaspoon oil over medium heat; add onion and bell pepper and sauté 1 to 2 minutes. Add tomatoes, reserved liquid, and seasonings and mix well. Reduce heat to low and let simmer, stirring occasionally, until mixture is thickened, 20 to 25 minutes; set aside.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Using 1/2 teaspoon oil (or PAM), brush 1 side of each eggplant slice with an equal amount of oil (or spray lightly with PAM); on nonstick baking sheet arrange slices oiled-side up and bake until browned, about 10 minutes. Turn slices over and brush each with 1/8 of the remaining oil (or spray lightly with PAM); bake 10 minutes longer. On sheet of wax paper (or in a bowl) dredge slices in Parmesan, evenly coating both sides and reserving any remaining cheese.

In shallow 2 quart casserole, spread 1/3 of the reserved tomato mixture; top with 4 eggplant slices, in a single layer and half of the Mozzarella. Repeat layers, ending with sauce. Sprinkle with any remaining Parmesan and top with mozzarella; bake at 400 degrees until cheese is lightly browned, 15-20 minutes.

Slow Cooker Spaghetti Squash

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 pound lean ground turkey

1 23.5 ounce jar marinara sauce

1 diced Portobello mushroom

1 small white onion diced

1 clove garlic minced

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/2 teaspoon oregano

1/2 teaspoon dried basil

1 3 pound spaghetti squash

Directions

Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. Brown ground turkey; add to slow cooker. Add marinara sauce, Portobello, onion, garlic, pepper, oregano and dried basil to slow cooker. Stir to combine. Cut squash in half lengthwise and remove seeds with a spoon. Nestle squash, cut side down into sauce. Cover and cook on high for 4 hours. Do not open lid during the cooking time. Remove squash from slow cooker; loosen strands with a fork; spoon sauce on top.
