## December Meeting Highlights


The December 14th lunch meeting was hosted by the **Environment CSP**. The devotion and blessing was given by Brenda Gay.

Two guests were welcomed, Susan Press and Barbara Gartland.

Highlights from the meeting:

- The Executive Board has approved a **special rate** of \$75 for book clubs and civic organizations to rent the clubhouse for up to 3 hours. No security deposit will be required for this special rate.
- The ESO Reading Bench was unveiled at the meeting. The bench artwork was designed by Val Taylor and painted by Robin Sachsenheimer and will be placed in the Main Street Community Garden.
- The Civitan Reverse Raffle and Silent Auction was very successful and the Civitan gave TWCC \$2025 for the Christmas Kids project.

- The Arts Festival for both students and clubwomen will be held February 9th at 6pm. All entries must be received by February 7th. Kid friendly snacks are needed as well as volunteers to help out during the event. Contact Susan Johnson to volunteer.
- Trish Perna reminded CSP and committee chairs that **reports** are due by December 31st.
- Dianne Carroll, Arts & Culture CSP Co-Chair, thanked members who went to River Dell Elementary on November 29th to make felt Christmas trees with the Special Needs class. The CSP had 16 extra tree kits so these were taken to Harbor House.

## Civic Engagement & Outreach CSP

The CEO CSP is participating in a national effort, Secure the Call (STC), between now and February 28, 2023. STC converts donated cell phones and tablets into 911 emergency-only phones, which

are given out to Community Partners across the USA at no charge. STC is a National Coalition of over 350 organizations, including Police and Sheriff's Departments (Victim Services Department), Domestic Violence Shelters, and Senior Citizen groups, demonstrating a need for emergency 911-only cell phones and tablets. STC collects these devices and clears them of any service, numbers, and address books. The phones are then reprogrammed to be able to dial 911 without a service contract and then are sent back out to their Coalition of Partners throughout the USA, who, in turn, distribute them for free to local communities. Devices can be securely placed in a bin located at Hocutt-Ellington Library. Your help is greatly needed and appreciated and will go a long way to making sure high-risk individuals always have access to emergency services. Attached to the end of the newsletter is a flyer about the program.

The CEO CSP purchased 3 wreaths in support of Wreaths Across America. Locally, Cub Scout Pack 124, was sponsoring the event and placing wreaths at Pinecrest Cemetery.



## **Recipe Corner—New Year's Day**

## Southern Caviar

#### INGREDIENTS

2 cans black-eyed peas - drained and rinsed 1 can whole kernel corn - drained (1 ½ cup of frozen corn thawed) 1 can diced tomatoes and green chilies (Rotel) - do not drain ½ cup fresh jalapeño peppers - minced ½ cup onion - minced ¼ cup chopped cilantro or parsley 1 cup (8 ounces) of Italian dressing Juice of one lemon Pinch of salt

## DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients. Stir gently to combine. Refrigerate for minimum 1 hour allowing flavors to marry.

## Crock Pot Spinach-Artichoke Dip

## Ingredients

- 1 10 ounce bag fresh spinach, roughly chopped
- 1 14 ounce can artichoke hearts, roughly chopped
- 1 8 ounce block cream cheese, cut into cubes
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 4 cloves minced garlic
- salt and pepper to taste

## Instructions

- 1. Add all ingredients to a small crock pot and stir. Put the lid on and set on LOW for 2 hours.
- 2. After 1 hour, remove lid, and stir. Replace lid and continue to cook for 1 additional hour.
- 3. Stir dip and taste to adjust seasoning with salt and pepper. Serve with crackers or chips.

## Servings 6

## **Bill Brooks Collard Greens**

#### Ingredients

- 6 lbs collards with thick stems removed
- 1 ½ cups ham (ham hocks from Nahunta preferred) 3 parts Water to 1 part Chicken Stock
  - <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sugar
  - 2 T Salt
  - 1 T Red Pepper Flakes
  - 1/2 T Black Pepper

## Instructions

- 1. Clean and remove thick stems from collards. Break leaves up as you clean them.
- 2. Boil water/chicken broth and then place collards into liquid. Boil for about 45 minutes.
- 3. Place collards and pieces of ham in freezer containers and cover with pot liquor.
