

INGREDIENTS

4 Tbsp Butter
1 large onion, diced
4 cloves garlic, minced
1 green bell pepper, diced
2 stalks celery, diced
1 lb dried black-eyed peas
5 cups chicken broth (plus more as needed)
1 whole ham hock
Kosher salt & pepper to taste
Cayenne pepper to taste
2 Tbsp white vinegar
White or brown rice, to serve

DIRECTIONS



Soak the black-eyed peas in cool water for at least 6 hrs. Rinse before using. Melt butter in large pot over med heat. Add onion, garlic, green pepper & celery. Cook for 3-4 minutes. Stir in the soaked beans, then add chicken broth & ham hock, salt pepper and cayenne to taste. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat & cover for 30 minutes.

Hoppin' John

After 30 minutes, check the liquid level, if too soupy, cook with the lid off for another 15 minutes. If too thick, splash in a little more broth. Stir in vinegar, then taste for seasonings. Add more spice as needed.

Serve over white or brown rice, making sure to get plenty of cooking liquid spooned over the top.

Hot Toddy

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 Cup Water
- 1.5 oz Whiskey
- 2-3 tsp honey, to taste
- 2-3 tsp lemon juice, to taste
- 1 lemon round 1 cinnamon stick

DIRECTIONS

In a teapot or saucepan, bring the water to a simmer. Pour the hot water into a mug

Add the whiskey, 2 tsp honey and 2 tsp lemon juice. Stir until the honey has dissolved. Taste and add additional honey for sweet-

ness and more lemon juice for additional zing. Garnish with a lemon round and cinnamon stick. Enjoy

2024 MURDER MYSTERY RECIPES

CHICKEN LASAGNA

INGREDIENTS

9 lasagna noodles
1 container fresh sliced mushrooms
1/2 cup chopped onions
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
2 Tbsp butter
16 oz ricotta cheese
3 cups cooked diced chicken
2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
1/3 cup milk
16 oz mozzarella cheese

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Cook and rinse lasagna noodles. Combine soup, milk, & mushrooms in a bowl. Sauté onions and green peppers in butter and stir into soup mixture. Place 3 noodles in a 9x13 inch casserole dish. Cover with 1/2 of the soup mixture, 1/2 of the ricotta cheese, 1/2 of the chicken and 1/3 of the cheeses which have been mixed together. Repeat the layers. Place the last three noodles on top and cover with the last 1/3 of the mixed cheeses.

Bake 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes

May be made the day before and refrigerated uncooked and then baked the next day.

Zucchini and Summer Squash Medley

INGREDIENTS

- 6 yellow summer squash, chopped into 1/2 inch pieces
- 6 zucchini, chopped into 1/2 inch pieces
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 Tbsp. minced garlic
- 3 Tbsp. olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 425°F.

Place squash, zucchini, onion, garlic and olive oil in a large bowl. Toss until the vegetables are coated. Add salt and pepper to taste and mix well.

Spread the vegetables on a sheet pan in a single layer. Roast for 15 minutes, then give them a good stir. Return them to the oven and roast for another 10 to 15 minutes, or until the edges are golden brown and crisp.
