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Home delivery Subscriptions for home delivery are available for \$36 per year.
Available online for free.

Have you heard about **REAL ID**? This ID, available from DMV, will be required on October 1, 2020 when stricter ID requirements go into effect. REAL IDs will make it easier to board airplanes, visit federal facilities and military bases. The REAL ID looks and works like your driver's license but there is a gold star in the upper right corner indicating you have met the identification standards required by the federal REAL ID Act. To obtain the REAL ID, go to DMV with documents that show identity and date of birth (e.g., birth certificate, valid passport or immigration documents), proof of NC residency (e.g., copy of utility bill, NC vehicle registration card or title, NC voter precinct card, property tax statement), and proof that you have a Social Security number (e.g., Social Security card, 1099 tax form, pay stub with full SSN or W-2 form with full SSN), legal name change (e.g., marriage license, divorce decree). The proof documents will be scanned and remain on file at DMV. (Refer to Requirements, page 14). The REAL ID can be obtained at the time of driver's license renewal or before the renewal period for the cost of a duplicate. For more information, visit NCRE-ALID.com.

Recipe Corner—Pasta



Baked Spaghetti

Ingredients

1 (16 ounce) package spaghetti

1 pound ground beef

1 onion, chopped

1 (32 ounce) jar meatless spaghetti sauce

1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

2 eggs

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

5 tablespoons butter, melted

2 cups small curd cottage cheese, divided

4 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided



Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.

2. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook spaghetti in boiling water, stirring occasionally until cooked through but firm to the bite, about 12 minutes. Drain.

3. Heat a large skillet over medium heat; cook and stir beef and onion until meat is browned and onions are soft and translucent, about 7 minutes. Drain. Stir in spaghetti sauce and seasoned salt.

4. Whisk eggs, Parmesan cheese, and butter in a large bowl. Mix in spaghetti to egg mixture and toss to coat. Place half the spaghetti mixture into baking dish. Top with half the cottage cheese, mozzarella, and meat sauce. Repeat layers. Cover with aluminum foil.

5. Bake in preheated oven for 40 minutes. Remove foil and continue to bake until the cheese is melted and lightly browned, 20 to 25 minutes longer.

Prep 25 min; Cook 1 hour; Ready in 1 hr, 25 min

Lasagna Delizioso

Ingredients

3 T Olive Oil

1 T finely chopped garlic

3/4 lb. sweet Italian Sausage

1 tsp basil

2 T + 2 1/4 salt, divided

2 large cans Crushed Tomatoes

6 oz can tomato paste

2 lbs Ricotta Cheese

1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley

6 qts boiling water

1 lb lasagna

1/2 Cup finely chopped onion

3/4 lb. ground chuck

2 tsp oregano

2 bay leaf

1 1/4 tsp pepper, divided

15 oz can tomato sauce

1 cup water

1 egg

12 oz shredded Mozzarella Cheese, divided

8 T grated Parmesan Cheese, divided

Directions

Sauce: In Dutch oven, brown sausage and drain grease; cool. Heat oil; add onion and garlic; sauté over medium heat 5 minutes. Crumble sausage and add to onion mixture. Stir in oregano, basil, bay leaf, 1 tsp salt and 1/2 tsp pepper. Add tomato products and water. Heat to boiling, reduce heat and summer uncovered 45-60 minutes.

2. Ricotta Filling: In large bowl, combine ricotta, egg, **1 1/4 tsp salt and 3/4 tsp pepper**. Beat with spoon till smooth. Stir in parsley, **8 oz diced moz**

zarella and 4 T grated Parmesan. Set aside.

3. Pasta: In large kettle, bring 6 qt water to boil; add **2 T salt**. Add lasagna strips, one at a time, keeping water boiling as you add. Boil uncovered 15 minutes. Drain in colander

4. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease two 7x11x2 inch baking dishes. Spoon a little tomato-meat sauce in bottom of each pan. Layer noodles, cheese mixture, sauce in dishes, ending with sauce. Sprinkle with remaining **grated cheese** and top with **4 oz. Mozzarella cheese**. * Bake 45-50 minutes till bubbly. Cool 15 minutes. *Or prepare to this point, cover and refrigerate or freeze. Bring to room temp, bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.




