# Clubwoman with "Heart" 2021 Nancy Maynard

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Award Entry sent to GFWC-NC: I had never heard of GFWC before moving to North Carolina four years ago. The more I learn about what the organization stands for the more I love it. I knew when I retired that I wanted to volunteer more, and The Woman's Club of Clayton (TWCC) has opened many doors for me to do just that. The day my friend Amy walked me into the clubhouse was a very good day for me. I was warmly welcomed from the first day and that warmth continues to grow. It didn't take me long to realize how special these ladies are that call themselves members of TWCC. Warm, loving, caring, strong, smart, dedicated, determined are only a few of the words that I can use to describe them. It warms my heart to see their kindness and compassion. It certainly inspires me to be a better person. I have

volunteered most of my life and through the club, I have learned that you don't have to be perfect to help others. You just need willingness, humility, and compassion. From an early age I was taught the importance of service to others and true "giving" comes from somewhere deep in our hearts. I must admit it took me a few years and many volunteer hours to totally grasp this concept. And now I know there are opportunities everywhere and nearly every day another one opens up. I have been co-chair of the Health and Wellness CSP for three years. It's a wonderful feeling when they come up to me and say how much fun they had and that they are looking forward to the next time we are on their calendar. The other activity that is especially dear to my heart is our monthly meals to the girls at House of Hope. To be even a small part of the healing process that the home strives for is a true blessing. We ALL rejoiced when we heard two girls graduated this past year! As a member of TWCC, I have many chances to continue my quest to serve others with deliberate acts of kindness. I'm excited to see what else we try next!

Outside of TWCC, I also am an active volunteer at St. Ann Catholic Church. With the Ladies Guild, I have taken meals to the needy, walked dogs at the animal shelter, driven people to doctor's appointments and made meals and served them at funeral luncheons. Every Friday I work at our church Food Pantry. We sort, bag, and distribute items to an average of 150-180 families weekly through our mission. This year we sang Christmas carols as they drove by to pick up their food. Everyone seemed to enjoy our singing despite our voices!

I love being with my fellow clubwomen whether it's an event we are hosting, attending our monthly meetings, or gathering in a social setting. I do my best to welcome the new members, so they aren't overwhelmed with all they are learning. I think it's important for people to feel included right from the beginning. I still remember the first few months that I was a member. It can be quite intimidating at times. I really enjoy meeting new people and truly believe we all have gifts to offer, and it is important to encourage ourselves and others to use them to the fullest. # Easy Lar

- Ingredients
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup Lemon Juice 2 T Olive Oil
  - 2 tsp Garlic (finely chopped, about 4 cloves)
- 1 tsp Sea Salt
- 1 tsp fresh Rosemary, chopped
- 1/2 tsp fresh Thyme, chopped
- 1 dash Cayenne Pepper
- 4 Lamb Loin Chops (about 34-1 inch thick)

#### Instructions

- 1. Mix ingredients, except for lamb, in a bowl.
- 2. Place the chops in a zip top bag and pour ingredients over chops. Seal the bag, after squeezing the air out, and squish the bag around to get the chops well covered on both sides.
- 3. Let marinate in the fridge overnight. The longer the better but give them at least one hour.
- 4. Remove the chops and let them come to room temperature (approximately 20 minutes) before cooking.
- 5. While the chops sit out, move an oven rack to the top position beneath the broiler, and preheat the oven on broil.
- 6. Place the chops (with the marinade) in a single layer in an oven proof skillet and place the skillet in the oven directly beneath the broiler.
- 7. Broil for 5-8 minutes on each side, using tongs to flip the chops, until they are seared on the outside and register around 145 degrees with a meat thermometer.
- 8. Drizzle with the pan juices before serving.

#### **Slow Cooker Lamb Stew**

#### Ingredients

- 2 lbs. Leg of lamb or lamb shoulder, boneless
- 1 lb. Baby Bella mushrooms
- 2 Bay leaves
- 3 Carrots (peeled and cut into 1/2" thick pieces), medium
- 2 Celery, ribs
- 4 cloves Garlic
- 1/4 cup Parsley
- 1 cup Peas, frozen sweet
- 1 1/2 lbs. red potatoes
- 1 tsp Rosemary, fresh
- 1 Rosemary, Fresh
- 1 Yellow onion, medium
- 2 cups Beef broth, low sodium
- 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup All-purpose flour
- 1 tsp Black pepper, ground
- 1 tsp Sea salt
- 1 1/2 cups red wine

#### Instructions

- 1. Cut the meat into about 1.5-inch pieces. Then, heat some olive oil in a skillet over medium heat, season the lamb, and brown on each side for about 3-5 minutes. Note, this step is optional, but I strongly suggest browning the meat as it locks in the flavor.
- 2. Then, place all the ingredients into the slow cooker, and add enough water/broth to cover the ingredients.
- 3. Cover and cook on LOW heat for 7-8 hours, or HIGH for 3-4 hours.
- 4. Garnish with some freshly chopped parsley and serve warm.
