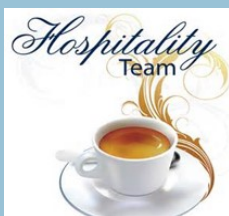

Thanks to our readers, Judy Hoffman, Bob Gay, Brenda Gay (pictured at left), Sandy Nesselrode and Arianna Harrison who got her friend to read to the Spanish class.

The Principal and teachers at Cooper Academy are very supportive of this project and would like it continued next year. Who knows, perhaps some of the students will be inspired to become authors like some we have in our club, who are Jan Hemby, Judy Hoffman, and Sandy Nesselrode.



We did not need to purchase books this year for the Book Bag project like last year as we collected them from Hocutt Library, Brenda Gay, Marlene Dillon, and Rachel Masimore. This left us with more funds we did not spend from our budget. We had \$400 plus an extra \$100 given to us as a donation from Sandy Nesselrode which she received from her son as a Christmas gift. After hearing the program on **Kiva**, Sandy asked that this \$100 go to Kiva which is a non-profit organization that allows people to lend money via the Internet to low-income entrepreneurs and students in over 80 countries.

Marlene Dillon and Brenda Gay have enjoyed being your Co Chairs for the past two years, **we thank you so much for your support.**

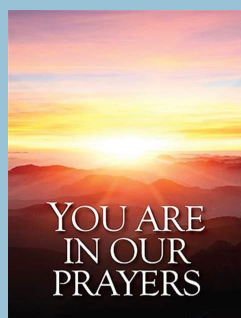

### Tips for Southern Gardens

#### Vegetables

- Direct seed warm-season vegetables (melons, beans, okra, squash, southern peas...) for a mid-summer harvest.



- Keep cool season crops harvested, so they'll keep producing as long as possible.
- Get heat-loving vegetables established (tomatoes, hot peppers, sweet potatoes...).

#### Flowers

- Replace cool-season annuals with heat lovers (marigold, cosmos, sunflower, tithonia, Nicotiana, verben a, zinnia...).



- Feed blooming roses.
- Mark bulb plantings that will need

to be divided in the fall.

#### Trees & Shrubs

- Finish planting new citrus trees and berry bushes for a late harvest.
- Prune flowering trees and shrubs as they finish blooming.



#### Pests

- Keep a sharp eye out for fungal problems during the rainy season.

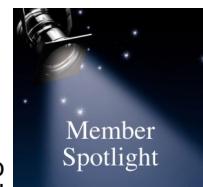

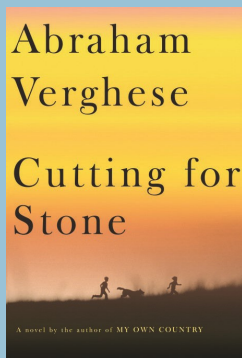

## Recipe Corner

### Pasta Primavera with Shrimp

#### Ingredients

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil, divided
- 2 lbs. peeled and deveined raw medium shrimp
- 3/4 tsp. kosher salt, divided
- 1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper (or more as desired)
- 1 large red bell pepper, chopped
- 5 oz. snap peas, diagonally halved crosswise
- 1/4 cup chopped shallot
- 10 oz. uncooked gemelli pasta
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 4 oz. baby spinach
- 1 1/2 cups chopped Broccolini (about 4 oz)
- 2 Tbsp. white wine vinegar
- 1/2 oz. pecorino Romano cheese, shredded (about 2 Tbsp)



#### Directions

1. Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a Dutch oven over medium-high. Sprinkle shrimp with 1/4 teaspoon of the salt and crushed red pepper. Add shrimp to Dutch oven; cook until cooked through, 3-4 minutes, stirring once. Remove shrimp; set aside.
2. Pour off any remaining drippings from Dutch oven. Add remaining 1 tablespoon oil. Add bell pepper, snap peas, and shallot, and cook, stirring often, until vegetables are tender, about 4 minutes. Add bell pepper mixture to shrimp; cover to keep warm.
3. Add pasta, stock, and remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt to Dutch oven; bring to a boil over medium-high. Boil pasta, stirring occasionally, until pasta is almost tender and stock is almost absorbed, about 9 minutes. Add spinach and Broccolini; cook until spinach is wilted, 1-2 minutes. Stir in shrimp mixture and vinegar. Remove from heat. Divide mixture evenly among 4 bowls; top with cheese and additional red pepper if desired.
