The **House of Hope** is located in Clayton and has long been a project that the Night 'N' Gals have officially embraced. Missy Naum has moved to Gar-

ner and no longer belongs to the Club. We did supply Missy with the art materials to work with these young ladies. This is a faith based facility that holds true to its 20 years of existence.

This phenomenal facility is home to young teen women who have been sexually violated, fallen prey to drugs, have contemplated suicide, have been victims of serious bullying, and at a juncture where their parents have lost control. These young women agree to become members of this program, where they must live together, take classes together and go through continuing psychological counseling. All of this is done on their small campus and parents must attend classes. The goal for this organization is to help the teen and their parents learn how to move on comfortably together with life.

The gala that was held, had a silent auction, guest speaker who is a youth pastor in NC, but had a daughter go through the program. He said he could help fix other teens, but he couldn't fix his daughter without help.



Member Spotlight—Brenda Gay

Biography:

I was born in Greenville, North Carolina, one of the youngest of five children, three brothers, one sister. Two brothers are deceased, one who served in Viet Nam and my oldest brother from heart attack at age 45. My Father died when I was in first grade so my Mother reared us. She was a great Mother! I have lived in Rocky Mount, NC, Florida, Greensboro, NC, Raleigh, NC. I at-



tended East Carolina University in Greenville, NC when I was in my 20's but my studies where interrupted when I entered a beauty pageant and won. While in Rocky Mount, NC, I attended a Community College in Kinston to study to become a dental Hygienist. I did not like being a hygienist but I was employed in a dental office for several years as manager of the office. I also taught cosmetology four nights a week at Sherrill's University of Hairstyling while in Raleigh, NC as well as working three days a week in the dental office.

TWCC Questions:

How long have you been a member of TWCC and how has membership in TWCC been of value to you?

I have been a member of TWCC for about 13 years. After I moved to Clayton, I went to Hocutt-Ellington Library to obtain a library card and check out books. I met Debbie Ragland there and mentioned I had just moved to Clayton. Debbie invited me to come as her guest to the Woman's Club and I thought to myself, why not. Recipe Corner

Steamed Collards

Ingredients

1 large head of collards 5 tablespoons shortening

1 teaspoon salt 1 cup water

Directions

Wash collards and chop coarsely. Heat shortening in pan. Add collards and salt. Add 1 cup of water and simmer for 30 minutes. Add more water if necessary.

Collard Greens

Ingredients

4 slices thick cut bacon 1 pound collard greens 1 small white onion 2 cloves garlic, minced

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper.

Directions

Line a plate with paper towels. Cut the bacon crosswise into 2-inch long pieces. Place in a large, cold skillet and cook over medium heat until crisp. Transfer the bacon to the lined plate to drain, remove the pan from heat.

Rinse the collards. Working in batches, stack the leaves, roll them tightly and cut crosswise into 1/2 inch wide strips, discarding only the thick base of the stem.

Return the skillet of bacon fat to medium heat. Add the onion and the garlic; cook for 5 or 6 minutes, until the onion becomes translucent and the garlic is fragrant. Stir in the salt and pepper.

Add the collards to the skillet; cook for 10 to 15 minutes, until they are wilted and have turned several shades darker.

Transfer the collards to a serving bowl. Chop the cooled bacon into pieces. Top the collards with bacon.

BBQ Collard Greens

Ingredients

1/4 cup lard1 medium yellow onion, diced1 large clove garlic, minced10 ounces smoked ham hockWater1 to 2 teaspoons kosher salt1 tablespoon vinegar based BBQ sauce1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

1 pound collard greens, stemmed and rinsed well

Directions

Melt the lard in a large, heavy bottomed pot over medium heat. Add the onion and garlic; cook for 5 to 7 minutes, until the onion is translucent.

Add the greens, the ham hock and enough water to cover the ingredients. Once the liquid begins to bubble at the edges, reduce the heat to medium low, cover and cook for about 45 minutes or until the collards are tender. Remove ham hock.

Add a teaspoon of the salt, all the barbecue sauce and the vinegar; taste and add some or all of the remaining salt as needed.


Serve warm or at room temperature with some of the cooking liquid.
