cups craft kits, jumbo craft sticks, washable markers, colored paper, popsicle sticks, and colored Post-it notes.

November is Nation Native American Heritage Month. The month-long celebration originated in New York State at the turn of the 20th century when Seneca archeologist, Dr. Arthur C Parker advocated for a federal



recognition day for Native Americans in 1916.

On August 3, 1990, President of the United States George H. W. Bush declared the month of November as National American Indian Heritage Month, also referred to as Native American Heritage Month. The bill read in part that "The President has authorized and requested to call upon Federal, State and local Governments, groups and organizations and the people of the United States to observe such month with appropriate programs, ceremonies and activities". This landmark bill honoring America's tribal people represented a major step in the establishment of this celebration which began in 1976 when a Cherokee/ Osage Indian named Jerry C. Elliott-High Eagle authored Native American Awareness Week legislation the first historical week of recognition in the nation for native peoples. This led to 1986 with then President Ronald Reagan proclaiming November 23–30, 1986, as "American Indian Week".[1]

This commemorative month aims to provide a platform for Native people in the United States of America to share their culture, traditions, music, crafts, dance, and ways and concepts of life. This gives Native people the opportunity to express to their community, both city, county and state officials their concerns and solutions for building bridges of understanding and friendship in their local area. Federal Agencies are encouraged to provide educational programs for their employees regarding Native American history, rights, culture and contemporary issues, to better assist them in their jobs and for overall awareness.





BY-LAW REVISIONS

Sarah Brooks



The Bylaws Committee proposed the below Bylaws revisions and these have been reviewed and approved by the Executive Board. Therefore, the revisions are presented to the membership for approval at the November 13th lunch meeting. Only those sections with proposed revisions are included here. The entire set of Bylaws is available on the Club's website at: twccnc.org/member-resources/

ARTICLE VI - EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section A. The officers of the Club, Immediate Past President, Community Service Program (hereinafter referred to in these Bylaws as "CSP") Co-Chairs, Ways and Means Co-Chairs, Rental Custodian, Parliamentarian, Newsletter Chair, ESO Chair, and Board of Trustees shall constitute the Executive Board.

Add the ESO Chair as a member of the Executive Board. The ESO Chair is not always a CSP Chair and the ESO Chair represents a very active component of TWCC.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section A. The President **s**hall preside at all Club meetings, Chair the Executive Board, and perform all duties pertaining to the office. She shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall appoint CSP Co-Chairs and all committees (except Nominating Committee), a Chaplain, Parliamentarian, Rental Custodian, Arts Festival Chair, Hospitality Chair, Newsletter Chair, ESO Chair, and Historian. She shall represent the Club at GFWC-NC meetings. She shall have charge of important papers of the club, such as bonds, insurance policies and the deed to the Clubhouse. These papers shall be placed in a safety deposit box rented by the Club and she shall have one key to the box. She shall sign Club checks in the absence of the Treasurer.

Establishes how the ESO Chair is appointed.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES AND APPOINTEES

Section C. The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer, the Ways and Means Co-Chairs, the First Vice President, a Trustee to be determined by the Trustees, immediate past Treasurer, and the Rental Custodian. This Committee shall prepare a budget for each year (based on expected receipts) which shall provide for the expenses of the Club. This budget shall be submitted to the Executive Board for approval and to the membership at the Annual Business Meeting for adoption.

Remove the First Vice-President as their participation is not necessary. Add a Trustee to the Finance Committee since funding for clubhouse maintenance is included in the budget. Add the immediate past Treasurer to provide history and guidance.

Section F. The Scholarship Committee shall consist of the Co-Chairs of the Education and Libraries CSP and two other Club members. They shall select a Sallie Southall Cotten Scholarship recipient following the rules and regulations of The Woman's Club of Clayton and GFWC-NC. The Woman's Club of Clayton Hocutt-Horne Scholarship Endowment shall be under the jurisdiction of the Scholarship Committee, the President, and the Treasurer. The Scholarship Committee shall select a Sybil Champion Community College Scholarship recipient following the rules and regulations of The Woman's Club of Clayton.

 $\underline{\textbf{Section K}}$. The Hospitality Committee shall consist of up to three Club members who coordinate meals and other services for incapacitated and recovering Club members.

The Committee Chair decides the number of members needed.

Section Q. The Parliamentarian facilitates efficient and democratic decision-making processes during general meetings and Executive Board meetings through the effective use of parliamentary procedure.

This appointed position is not currently defined in the bylaws.

Section R. The Rental Custodian shall manage requests for the use of the TWCC clubhouse from both members and non-members. She will work with the Treasurer to ensure that deposits and rental payments are made when required and will respond to questions about and during the rental process. She will work with the Clubhouse Custodian and Treasurer to ensure that any damage occurring during the rental process is properly reimbursed.

This appointed position is not currently defined in the bylaws.

Section S. The Epsilon Sigma Omicron (ESO) Chair plans and directs activities of TWCC members who pay dues to belong to ESO. ESO is an honorary educational society open to all per-capita dues paying GFWC federated clubs. The purpose of ESO is to provide clubwomen with a structural reading program, which is educational and stimulates a desire for self-improvement.

This appointed position is not currently defined in the bylaws.

Turkey Cheese Ball

INGREDIENTS

Cheese Ball

2 (8oz) packages cream cheese—softened 3.5 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese 1 (1oz) pkg Ranch-style dressing mix 2 cups chopped pecans

For the Turkey:

1 cup whole pecans 7 whole-wheat crackers 1/4 red bell pepper 1 black olive 1/2 tsp cream cheese softened 1 slice yellow zucchini



DIRECTIONS

Mix cream cheese, Cheddar, and dressing mix in a large bowl. Form into ball. Roll in chopped pecans to coat surface. Refrigerate for 2 hours or overnight. To decorate the turkey, arrange a row of whole-wheat crackers in the back of cheese ball for turkey feathers. Stick pecans evenly into cheese ball for the body.

Cut 2 strips of red bell pepper for the head & neck. Cut out 2 'eyes' from the black olive. Place 2 small dollops of cream cheese on one of the 2 bell pepper strips for the turkey head and stick the black olive circles into it as pupils. Cut a small triangular slice out of the yellow zucchini for the turkey beak & stick to the red pepper with cream cheese. Stick the undecorated red bell pepper on the front of the cheese ball. Stick the red bell pepper stick with the face into the top of the cheese ball for the head.

PUMPKIN PIE

INGREDIENTS

1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 cup cold butter or shortening

3 Tbsp cold water, more as needed

2 cups mashed, cooked pie pumpkin

1 (12oz) can evaporated milk

2 lg eggs, beaten

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/2 tsp ground cinnamon, or more to taste

1/2 tsp ground ginger, or more to taste

1/2 tsp ground nutmeg, or more to taste

1/2 tsp salt

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Crust: Mix flour & salt. Cut in butter with pastry blender until it resembles coarse crumbs. Mix in 3 Tbsps water, one at a time, until dough is moist enough to hold together. Add up to 1 more Tbsp water if needed.

Shape dough into a ball with lightly floured hands. Roll on floured surface to thickness of 1/8". Place a 9 inch pit pan upside-down on the dough; use a sharp knife to cut a circle of dough 1 1/2 inches larger than the pie pan. Remove and set pan aside.

Gently roll circular piece of dough around the rolling pin; transfer to right-side up over the pie pan. Unroll, easing dough into bottom of pan. Use 2 hand to flute the dough around

Filling: Beat pumpkin, evaporated milk, brown sugar, eggs, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, & salt in large bowl with electric mixer. Pour into prepared crust.

Bake until knife inserted comes our clean (40-50 minutes).

Remove and cool to room temp before serving.
