Joy Garretson, Hocutt Ellington Library Director, was our speaker in September and she told about the following grant the library received:



ESO Book Club





Recipe Corner—Pork



Roast Pork with Spiced Cherry Sauce

Ingredients

1 (3-4 lb.) boneless pork loin roast

1 tsp salt

1 tsp pepper

1 tsp rubbed sage

1 (14.5 oz) can pitted sour cherries

12 whole cloves

1 stick cinnamon

1 ½ cups sugar

1/4 cup white vinegar


¼ cup cornstarch

1 T lemon juice

1 T melted butter or margarine

3-4 drops red food coloring

Instructions:



<u>Cherries:</u> Drain cherries; reserve liquid, and add water to make ¾ cup, if necessary. Tie cloves and cinnamon in cheesecloth bag. Combine ½ cup cherry liquid, sugar, vinegar and spice bag in saucepan. Bring to boil; reduce heat; simmer uncovered 10 minutes. Remove spice bag. Combine cornstarch and remaining ¼ cup cherry liquid – stir in hot liquid. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, 1 minute or till mixture is thickened and bubbly. Stir in cherries, lemon juice, butter and food coloring.

Slice roast into ½ inch pieces. Place roast on platter. Garnish with purple and green kale, lemon wedges. Serve with sauce.

Yield: 6-8 servings



Ingredients

2 pork tenderloins, trimmed, cut into 3 inch cubes (3 lbs.) 1 large red onion, cut into 1 1/2 inch thick half-moon rings

1 large red onion, cut into 1 1/2 inch thick h 1 cup diced onion

3 T unsalted butter

3/4 cup ketchup

1/2 cup each fresh orange juice, cider vinegar and bourbon

1/3 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup molasses

2 T Worcestershire sauce

Salt and Pepper to taste

Instructions:

<u>Sauce</u>: Cook diced onion in butter in a saucepan over medium heat until soft, 4-5 minutes. Stir in ketchup, orange juice, vinegar, bourbon, brown sugar, molasses, and Worcestershire. Season with salt and pepper. Bring sauce to a boil, reduce to simmer, and cook 10 minutes; let cool slightly, then puree with a handheld blender. Reserve half the sauce for serving.

<u>Kebabs:</u> Preheat grill to medium-high. Brush grill grate with oil. Thread pork cubes and red onion on double skewers; season with salt and pepper. Grill kebabs, covered, 3-4 minutes on one side. Baste kebabs with remaining sauce, then flip and grill 3-4 minutes more. Baste kebabs again, flip, and continue cooking and basting until an instant-read thermometer inserted in to the centers registers 145 degrees, about 4 minutes more. Let kebabs rest 5 minutes before serving with reserved sauce.

Yield: 4 servings
