Arts Festival to be held the first week of January

All entrants are limited to non-professionals. Any earnings from craftwork must not exceed \$500 per year. One article per category will be declared the winner and will be entered in district competition. If only one article is entered in a category, it shall be declared the winner. Contest Entry Labels: Label entries properly. Each article must be labeled with an Entry Label. It should be folded in half and the contest information showing. Yarn, ribbon or lightweight string can be used to attach the card to the item or to a safety pin, pinned to the item so it may be flipped.

Craft Categories

- 1. Basic Embroidery (on stamped canvas or fabric using basic embroidery stitches)
- 2. Counted Cross Stitch
- 3. Needlepoint
- 4. Crochet (small doilies, placemats, etc.)5. Crochet (large bedspreads, afghans, etc.)
- 6. Crochet (garments sweaters, etc.)
- 7. Knitting (small pillows, doilies, etc.)
- 8. Knitting (large afghans, etc.)
- 9. Knitting (accessories, scarves, booties, etc.)
- 10. Knitting (garments only sweaters, etc.)
- 11. Quilting Machine (small baby quilts, pillows, wall hangings, etc.) 12. Quilting Hand (small baby quilts, pillows, wall hangings, etc.)
- 13. Quilting Machine (large full quilts, pieced or appliqué) 14. Quilting Hand (large full quilts, pieced or appliqué)
- 15. Hooked work (rugs, wall hangings, etc.)
- 16. Weaving (loom or hand-constructed)
- 17. Ribbon Embroidery
- 18. Plastic Canvas

19. Original Design: Can be done with any of the foregoing needlework techniques or combinations. Design must be conceived and executed by the entrant. A work sheet must accompany the piece, which describes planning, and execution. Include chart if used.

- 20. Basket Craft (reed, pine needle, etc.)
- 21. Ceramics (made from molds)

Recipe Corner

Penne Pesto Goat Cheese Alfredo

Ingredients

- 1 Tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 links Italian sausage (sweet or hot), casings removed
- 1 large clove garlic
- 1 can low sodium lowfat cream of chicken soup
- 5.3 oz goat cheese
- 1/4 cup skim milk
- 2 cups cooked chicken
- 1/4 cup fresh chives
- 1/2 cup oil packed sundried tomatoes
- 1/4 tsp black pepper
- 2 Tbsp basil pesto
- 1/3 cup plus 3 Tbsp grated parmesan cheese, divided 8 oz penne pasta

Directions

- 1. In a non-stick, large sauté pan, heat oil. Sauté sausage and garlic until sausage is no longer pink and sausage is broken up. Stir in soup, goat cheese and milk, stirring until cheese is melted and mixture is combined.
- 2. Add chicken, chives, sundried tomatoes and pepper. Bring mixture to a simmer and cook for 8 minutes.
- 3. Stir in pesto and 1/3 cup parmesan cheese. Cook additional 2 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, cook pasta as directed on package. Drain and place on serving platter.
- *5.* Pour chicken mixture over top of pasta and sprinkle with remaining 3 Tbsp of parmesan cheese.

Bolognese

Ingredients

- 1 pound meatloaf mix
- 2 cans tomato paste
- 2 1/2 cans low sodium beef broth
- 1 quart heavy cream

1/3 pound little pieces of pepperoni Hot pepper sauce (small amount) Rigatoni

Directions

- 1. Sauté onion and garlic in olive oil.
- 2. Add meatloaf mix and pepperoni. Cook until meat is browned.
- 3. Add beef broth and hot pepper and continue to cook a little more.
- 4. Add heavy cream and simmer for 1/2 hour on very low heat so cream will not scorch.
- 5. Cook Rigatoni according to package directions.
- 6. Serve Bolognese over Rigatoni.
