Oprah's Lemon Drop Martini These are fantastic! Do not substitute store bought juice for the fresh squeezed lemons. Cheers!

Ingredients:

Juice of 6 lemons 4 tablespoons sugar 6 fresh mint leaves 4 shots vodka Ice in shaker 1 sugar-rimmed martini glass



Mix lemon juice, sugar and vodka in a martini shaker filled with ice. Shake well and pour into sugar-rimmed martini glass. Garnish with mint.

Russian Tea (from scratch)

Ingredients

8 cups boiling water 5 tea bags 2 cups sugar 8 cups cold water 1 tsp whole allspice 1 tsp whole cloves Juice of 1 lemon 6 oranges



Pour boiling water over tea bags and steep 3 minutes. Remove tea bags. In another pot, combine sugar and cold water with spices and have this come to a boil. Remove from heat and add to tea mixture. Preparation can be done to this point before time for serving. When ready to serve, heat mixture to boiling and add juice of lemon and oranges.

Russian Tea (Instant)

Ingredients ¹/₂ cup instant tea (no sweetener or lemon) 1 ¹/₄ cups sugar 2 cups Tang (if not in stores, available on Amazon) ¹/₂ tsp ground cloves 1 tsp cinnamon 1 or 2 pkgs of lemonade mix



Combine all ingredients and mix well. Store in airtight container. Put desired amount into very hot or boiling water.

The Perfect Cosmopolitan

Ingredients

1 1/2 oz Vodka (recommend Tito's) 1/2 oz Cointreau 1/2 oz Cranberry Juice Fresh Lime Wedge



In a cocktail shaker with ice, add the above ingredients and shake for at least 15 seconds. Strain into a chilled martini glass and garnish with a lemon twist.

How to Register to Vote

First, check to see if you are already registered at: https://vt.ncsbe.gov/RegLkup/

If you are not already registered, you may register to vote in Johnston County if you are:

- A citizen of the United States (if convicted of a felony, citizenship rights must have been restored).
- A person 18 years of age of older.

• A legal resident of Johnston County for 30 days by the date of the next election. Johnston County has a permanent registration system. You need to register, transfer, or re-register ONLY if you:

- Have not registered in Johnston County before.
- Have moved to a different voting precinct since you registered in Johnston County. If you move, it is a violation of the law to return to your old precinct after 30 days.
- Wish to change your party affiliation.
- Have changed your name.

Complete the Voter Registration Application

The State Board of Elections issues the standard Voter Registration application. You can download a copy from the link below:

A voter registration card will be mailed to you once your registration application has been processed. They are mailed monthly. Keep the card as it may be used to change your address by mail should you move, change your name or change your party within Johnston County. It can also be used to cancel your Johnston County registration should you move out of the county.

A registration form must be postmarked 25 days before election or delivered to the Board of Elections office no later than 25 days before election in order to be good for that election.

In addition, you may change your address by filling out the back of your voter registration card and returning it to the Board of Elections. CARD MUST BE POST-MARKED 25 DAYS BEFORE ELECTION OR RECEIVED IN THE BOARD OF ELEC-TIONS OFFICE BY 5:00 PM, 25 DAYS BEFORE ELECTION.
