If you do not remember the password, call or text Sarah Brooks at 919-601-7959 The deadline for **Real ID**, available from DMV, has been extended once again to **May 3**, **2023.** The original deadline of October 1, 2020 has been extended twice due to the Coronavirus.

REAL IDs will make it easier to board airplanes, visit federal facilities and military bases. The REAL ID looks and works like your driver's license but there is a gold star in the upper right corner indicating you have met the identification standards required by the federal REAL



ID Act. To obtain the REAL ID, go to DMV with documents that show <u>identity</u> and date of birth (e.g., birth certificate, valid passport or immigration documents), <u>proof of NC residency</u> (e.g., copy of utility bill, NC vehicle registration card or title, NC voter precinct card, property tax statement), and <u>proof that</u> <u>you have a Social Security number</u> (e.g., Social Security card, 1099 tax form, pay stub with full SSN or W-2 form with full SSN), <u>legal name change (e.g.,</u> <u>marriage license, divorce decree)</u>. The proof documents will be scanned and remain on file at DMV. The REAL ID can be obtained at the time of driver's license renewal or before the renewal period for the cost of a duplicate. For more information, visit NCREALID.com.

Ingredients 1 (28 ounce) can whole tomatoes, chopped with their juices

- 2 cups chicken broth (see note)
- 34 cup ketchup
- ¹/₂ cup sweet, tomato-based barbecue sauce (Western North Carolina style)
- ¹/₂ cup peppery, vinegar-based barbecue sauce (Eastern North Carolina style) or white distilled vinegar
- ¹/₄ cup Worcestershire sauce
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons freshly ground pepper
- 1 Tablespoon hot sauce, or to taste
- 1 1/2 cups chopped onion
- 3 cups green butterbeans
- 3 cups yellow corn kernels
- 1 pound pulled smoked or roasted chicken meat
- 1 ¹/₄ pounds pulled pork barbecue

Instructions:

- Bring the tomatoes, broth, ketchup, barbecue sauces, Worcestershire, salt, pepper and hot sauce to a simmer in a large pot. Simmer 10 minutes, stirring often.
- Stir in the onion and butterbeans. Simmer until they are almost tender, about 20 minutes.
- Stir in the corn, chicken and pork. Simmer until the vegetables are tender, about 10 minutes more.
- Adjust the seasoning. It should be balanced, but unequivocal.

Note: If you purchase the chicken on the bone, pull the meat and refrigerate until needed. Place the skin and carcass in a saucepan and add 3 cups storebought chicken broth. Simmer until the liquid reduces to 2 cups. Strain and discard the solids.

Frogmore Stew

Ingredients 6 qts water ³/₄ cup Old Bay Seasoning 2 lbs new red potatoes 2 lbs hot smoked sausage links, cut into 2-inch pieces 12 ears corn – husked, cleaned and quartered 4 lbs large fresh shrimp, unpeeled

Instructions:

- Bring water and Old Bay Seasoning to a boil in a large stockpot.
- Add potatoes and cook for 15 minutes.
- Add sausage and cook for 5 minutes more. Add corn and cook for another 5 minutes.
- Stir in the shrimp and cook until shrimp are pink, about 5 minutes. Drain immediately and serve.

Yield: 12 servings

Recipe Corner—Stews

Chicken Stew

Ingredients 2 boneless chicken breasts cooked, cut into bite sized pieces 2 TB butter 4 small red potatoes quartered 1 c baby carrots halved 1 10 3/4 oz can cream of chicken soup 1/2 c milk 1 c chicken broth 1/2 c sour cream

1 oz packet dry ranch dressing mix or 3 TB salt and pepper to taste 1 tsp Parsley flakes

Instructions:

- Add butter to the bottom of a crock pot. Let melt. Stir in all of the vegetables coating with the butter. Season diced chicken as desired and add to the crock pot.
- In a separate bowl, mix together the soup, milk, sour cream, chicken broth, and ranch dressing mix. Pour on top of the chicken. Cover and cook on high for 3-4 hours or on low for 4-6.
- Sprinkle with parsley and serve!

Wendy's Chili

Wendy 5 chi

- **Ingredients** 2 pounds fresh ground beef
- 1 quart tomato juice
- 1 (29-ounce) can tomato purée
- 1 (15-ounce) can red kidney beans, drained
- 1 (15-ounce) can pinto beans, drained
- 1 medium-large onion, chopped (about 1 1/2 cups) 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/4 cup diced green bell pepper
- 1/4 cup chili powder (use less for milder chili)
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin (use more for real flavor)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Instructions:

In a large skillet, brown the ground beef. Drain off the fat. Put the beef and the remaining ingredients in a 6-quart pot. Cover the pot and let the chili simmer for 1 to 1 1/2 hours, stirring every 15 minutes. You can also cook this in a slow cooker on low for 3 to 4 hours.
