Recipe Corner—Entering into Fall



Oven Roasted Parmesan Potatoes

INGREDIENTS

2 tsp vegetable oil, or as needed 2 Tbsp freshly grated Parmesan cheese 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp garlic powder 1/2 tsp paprika 1/4 tsp black pepper 2 pounds red potatoes, halved 1/4 cup sour cream (optional) Cooking spray



DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spray a 9x13-inch baking pan or cast iron skillet with cooking spray; pour in about 1 teaspoon vegetable oil to coat bottom.

Mix Parmesan, salt, garlic powder, paprika, and pepper together in a bowl.

Blot dry the cut-side of potatoes with a paper towel to remove any moisture.

Place potatoes in a bowl and drizzle with 1 tablespoon vegetable oil; toss until potatoes are lightly coated. Sprinkle potatoes with Parmesan mixture; toss to coat.

Bake for 15-20 minutes. Flip potatoes and continue baking until golden and crispy, 15-20 more minutes. Serve with sour cream.

Serve hot and enjoy!

PUMPKIN DESSERT

INGREDIENTS

Crust:

1 (15.25oz) pkg yellow cake mix, divided 1/3 cup unsalted butter, melted

1 lg egg

Filling:

1 (29oz) can pumpkin puree

3 lg eggs

2/3 cup milk

1/2 cup brown sugar

2 Tbsp pumpkin pie spice

Topping:

1/2 cup white sugar

1/4 cup unsalted butter, cubed

3/4 cup chopped walnuts

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9x13 baking dish

Make crust: Transfer 1 cup cake mix to a small bowl; set aside for topping. Place remaining cake mix in a medium bowl with melted butter and egg; mix until blended.

Spread mixture into the bottom of the prepared baking dish.

Make filling: Combine pumpkin puree, eggs, milk, brown sugar, and pumpkin pie spice in a large bowl; mix well and pour over crust.

Make topping: Add white sugar and cubed butter to reserved cake mix; use a pastry blender to mix until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Sprinkle over pumpkin filling, then scatter chopped walnuts of the top

Bake in the oven until the top is golden brown, 45-50 minutes.
