Fairy Garden: We are asking each CSP and the ESO to provide fairy garden accessories that represent their CSP and bring them to the April meeting. For example, the Health & Wellness CSP has provided a swing set and slide. Amazon has a lot of fairy garden accessories, or your CSP may want to make their own items. If CSPs have questions about the garden, please contact Rhonda Nielsen. The Environment CSP will add plants and Fairy Garden figurines to the TWCC planter box at the Main Street Community Garden after the April meeting. Soft Plastic Collection: Member have reported the collection of 576 pounds of soft plastic since October. If we continue at this pace, we should be able to reach the goal of 1000 pounds of plastic collected in one year thus making us eligible for another Trex bench. The bench will be located on TWCC clubhouse grounds. Soft plastic includes such things as grocery bags, bread bags, bubble wrap, newspaper sleeves, ice bags, plastic shipping envelopes, Ziploc and other food storage bags, drink case overwrap, produce bags, bags from yard products such as mulch, etc. Weigh the plastic and report the weight to Sarah Brooks (sbrooks@twccnc.org or text to 984-323-2625). Deposit the bags in Food Lion, Harris Teeter or Lowes Food recycle bins.

Collect old athletic shoes (any brand such as Nike, Reebok) and bring them to the monthly meetings. ENV CSP members will take the shoes to the Nike store in Smithfield for recycling as part of the Nike Grind program.

Collect musical instruments for recycling. The Environment CSP and Arts and Culture CSP are collaborating on this project. The Environment CSP will collect the instruments, and the Arts and Culture CSP will take the instruments to Archer Lodge Middle School, where they have adopted the Middle School Band Class. We kindly request members to connect with their neighbors, friends, and family to inquire if they possess any unused musical instruments that they are willing to donate. March 6 is National "Slam the Scam" Day. The Social Security Administration (SSA) has designated March 6 as its annual Slam the Scam Day. The day is intended to raise awareness of Social Security-related and other government imposter scams. Keeping informed about these types of scams is the most effective method for deterring cyber criminals. National Slam the Scam Day began in 2020 to educate the public on ways to combat Social Security-related scams. Due to the frequently changing tactics used by scammers, the initiative has since expanded to include other government imposter scams. Slam the Scam Day is held annually as part of the Federal Trade Commission's National Consumer Protection Week, which takes place this year from March 2-8.



The SSA issued a warning on February 11, 2025 about a new scam tactic by criminals trying to lure potential retirement applicants to their site. This recent scam email appears to be from SSA and has the subject line: "Claim Benefits!" It states "Important: Apply for

Your Social Security Benefits Starting in 2025". **THIS EMAIL IS NOT FROM SSA.** Clicking on the link within the email redirects individuals to a fraudulent site.

The SSA is advising to always be cautious of responding to unsolicited emails that appear to be from an official government entity, such as SSA, or another federal agency. These emails are a variation of government imposter scams. **DELETE IT**. Don't click on links or respond to any text, email, phone call, or letter that has characteristics of a scam.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM

Stop talking to the scammer. Notify financial institutions and safeguard accounts.

Report Social Security-related scams to SSA OIG (oig.ssa.gov). Contact local law enforcement and file a police report.

If you lost money, file a complaint with the Federal Bureau of Investigation Internet Crime Complaint Center (ic3.gov).

Report other scams to the Federal Trade Commission (ftc.gov).

Keep financial transaction information and the record of all communications with the scammer.

April is Jazz Appreciation Month. JAM is a music festival held every April in Canada and the United States, in honor of jazz as an early American art form. JAM was created in 2001 by John Edward Hasse, curator of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. It became a national extension of the original Jazz Awareness Month created by the Louisiana Jazz Federation in New Orleans in 1980.



Jazz Appreciation Month was created to be an annual event that would pay tribute to jazz as both a living and as a historic music. Schools, organizations, and governments celebrate JAM with free concerts and educational programs. Its first year was 2001, with funding provided by the Ella Fitzgerald Charitable Foundation, which continues to support JAM every year. [

JAM culminates with the international celebration of <u>International Jazz Day</u> on April 30.





Maple-Bourbon Glazed Ham

INGREDIENTS

1 (8-9lb) fully cooked bone-in spiral-cut ham

1 cup pure maple syrup

1/2 cup packed dark brown sugar

1/2 cup bourbon

1/2 tsp grated fresh ginger

1/4 tsp ground cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350F

Bake Ham

Place ham in large

Roasting pan, fill pan with water to a depth of 1/2 in. Cover pan with aluminum foil. Bake in preheated oven until ham registers 120 degrees (about 2 hours), basting every 30 minutes with pan juices.

Make Glaze:

Stir together maple syrup, brown sugar, bourbon, ginger & cinnamon in medium saucepan; bring to a boil over med-high heat. Cook, stirring occasionally until thickened, 6 to 8 minutes. Remove from heat. Cover to keep warm, and set aside.

Add Glaze to Ham:

Remove ham from oven; remove and discard foil. Increase oven temp to 400. Using a pastry brush, glaze ham with 1/3 cup maple mixture; set aside remaining glaze.

Continue baking & glazing ham:

Return ham to oven and bake at 400 until top is lightly caramelized and internal temp reaches 145 degrees (about 30 minutes), brushing with remaining glaze every 10 minutes. Remove from oven.

Rest Ham, and Serve:

Transfer ham to platter; let rest 15 minutes. Serve
