Thanks to **Sandy Nesselrode** and **Ginny Kennerly** for working with **Debra Beal** on this endeavor.

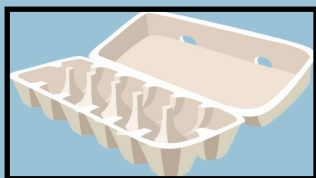

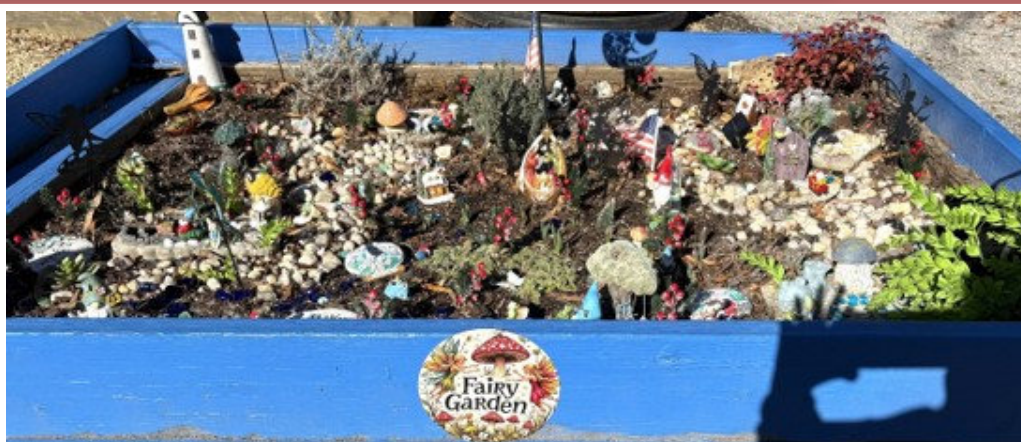
Your support and participation in these programs show what we can achieve together. Let's keep the spirit of giving alive throughout the year.

We would like to wish everyone a very Happy New Year. We hope your year is filled with lots of joy, love, and lots of adventures.

The Southern New Year's traditions begin on New Year's Day with a meal of black-eyed peas, greens (collards, turnips, mustard, etc.), pork (fatback, smoked sausage, pork chops, etc.) and cornbread. The black-eyed peas are for good luck, the greens are for wealth, the cornbread for good fortune, and the pork is because pigs move forward, not backward, so you learn from the past but keep going forward.

Other New Year's traditions around the world include:

Eat 12 grapes at midnight (Spain)

Nochevieja, Spanish for "New Year's Eve," is a tradition from Spain and also a Mexican New Year tradition to bring luck for the next year. At midnight, celebrators eat *las doce uvas de la suerte* (12 grapes for luck) to symbolize the hours on the clock.

Serve oysters and Champagne (France)

A traditional part of French New Year's Eve parties is *Le Réveillon de la Saint Sylvestre* or *Le Réveillon du Nouvel An*, a feast that often includes oysters, foie gras, and of course, Champagne. The custom alludes to Aphrodite, the goddess of love and beauty who emerged from the ocean on a beautiful oyster shell.

Dress in polka dots (Philippines)

Like many other cultures, Filipino New Year's traditions involve wishing for good luck and prosperity for the next year. Wearing polka dots is traditionally thought to bring prosperity and wealth since the round shapes look like coins.

Hang onions (Greece)

Welcome good spirits of fortune and fertility into your year by hanging onions above your door. Bonus: You can use them the next day for a delicious Greek New Year's Day meal.

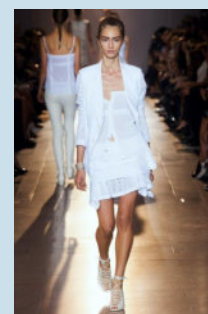

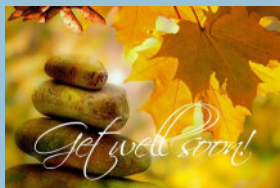

Nominating Committee—Brenda Hill



This Committee has been assigned to select candidates to serve as officers during the 2026–2028 administration which begins in May 2026 and concludes in May 2028. We would like to have at least two candidates for each office so we need your help and encourage you to let me know if you have an interest in any of the below positions. Officers serve on the Executive Board and some officers may also serve on some committees. Anyone who joined TWCC prior to March 2025 is eligible to serve as an officer for the upcoming term. Officer descriptions are below so **please contact Brenda Hill** via email at silver1188@aol.com or phone/text at 919-247-7617. I know we have members who possess qualifications to fill these positions but with more than 80 members, our committee may not be aware of your qualifications so please reach out!

President. The President shall preside at all Club meetings, Chair the Executive Board, and perform all duties pertaining to the office. She shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall appoint CSP Co-Chairs and all committees (except Nominating Committee), a Chaplain, Parliamentarian, Rental Custodian, Arts Festival Chair, Hospitality Chair, Newsletter Chair, ESO Chair, and Historian. She shall represent the Club at GFWC-NC meetings. She shall have charge of important papers of the club, such as bonds, insurance policies and the deed to the Clubhouse. These papers shall be placed in a safety deposit box rented by the Club and she shall have one key to the box. She shall sign Club checks in the absence of the Treasurer._

First Vice-President. The First Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in her absence or vacancy. She shall be Director of CSPs. (The First Vice-President shall not be assigned to a CSP.) She shall assist the CSP Co-Chairs in formulating the current program of work, which should reflect the ideals and policies of GFWC-NC. With the Second Vice-President, she shall assign Club members to CSPs. She shall work with the President on yearly GFWC-NC reports._

Second Vice-President. The Second Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in her absence and in the absence of the First Vice-President. She shall be Director of Leadership/Membership. She shall formulate and coordinate plans for the orientation of new Club members. She shall also be responsible for GFWC organizational training and leadership development for all Club members. With the First Vice-President she shall assign Club members to CSPs. She shall work with the Treasurer to ensure the membership roster is kept up to date and available on the Club website and ensure member name tags are current. She shall chair and appoint a committee to nominate Club members for Clubwoman awards. She shall also chair the Yearbook Committee._

Recording Secretary. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Executive Board and any business conducted at monthly Club meetings. She shall maintain a list of Standing Rules. She shall ensure the roll is taken at all Club meetings by the CSP Co-Chairs and will take roll at all Executive Board meetings.

Corresponding Secretary. The Corresponding Secretary shall assist the President with the general correspondence of the Club. She shall read important correspondence at meetings. She shall keep the minutes in the absence of the Recording Secretary. Upon request of the President, she shall send out communications to all Club members. _

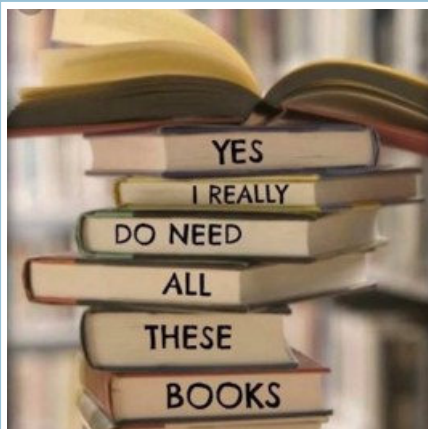
Treasurer. The Treasurer shall receive and bank all monies due the Club, keep records of receipts and disbursements, collect membership dues and report payment of dues to the Second Vice-President, pay bills by check (upon the approval of the Executive Board; any check over \$500 shall require two signatures), and present a financial statement at regular meetings and a complete financial report which will be presented at the Annual Business Meeting for inclusion in the minutes. She shall have a key to the safety deposit box and shall place the papers in the box and keep an inventory of the box. The Treasurer shall also have a key to the Post Office box and will check for correspondence on a regular basis. She shall serve as Chair of the Finance Committee. She shall submit dues, membership lists and project monies to GFWC-NC and to District 8, subject to their requirements. She shall send a payment each December to GFWC-NC for the 1902 Society from The Woman's Club of Clayton

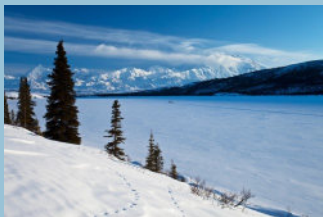

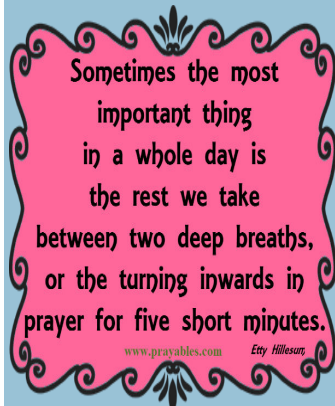
SMITHFIELD — Soon, children taken from their homes because of abuse or neglect will have a safe, comforting place to stay while awaiting a foster home.

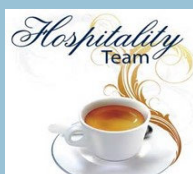

GFWC-NC Clubwoman Arts Categories Clubwoman Crafts Categories

1. All entrants are limited to non-professionals as defined in the GFWC-NC Arts Festival Rules and Procedures. Any earnings from craftwork must not exceed \$500 per year.
2. One article per category will be declared the winner at the Local level and then will be entered in the District competition.
3. Label entries correctly. Each article must be labeled with an Entry Label. It should be folded in half and the contest information showing. Yarn, ribbon, or lightweight string can be used to attach the card to the item or to a safety pin, pinned to the item so it may be flipped. DO NOT tape or pin the label directly to the item.
4. Needlework items may be framed under glass.
5. All entries must have been completed within the prior year of the Festival

Needlework:

- CC1. Basic Embroidery (on stamped canvas or fabric using basic embroidery stitches)
CC2. Counted Cross Stitch
CC3. Crochet (small – doilies, placemats, etc.)
CC4. Crochet (large – bedspreads, afghans, etc.)
CC5. Crochet (garments – sweaters, etc.) CC6. Knitting (accessories, scarves, booties, etc.)
CC7. Knitting (garments only – sweaters, etc.)
CC8. Quilting - Machine (small – baby quilts, pillows, wall hangings, etc.)
CC9. Quilting - Machine (large – full quilts, pieced or appliqué)

Crafts:

- CC10. Jewelry (any single medium or combination)
CC11. Painting on fabric, wood, metal or other surfaces
CC12. Nature Craft (dried flowers, etc.)
CC13. Sequin and Bead Craft (flowers, jewel pictures, Indian beading, ornaments, etc.)
CC14. Paper Craft (quilling, paper sculpture, Papier-mâché, etc.)
CC15. Scrapbooking (single page submission only)
CC16. Glass Craft (stained glass, etc.)
CC17. Fabric Craft (appliqué, felt/burlap work, wall hangings, etc. – not stenciling)
CC18. Upcycling (creative reuse is the process of transforming unwanted products into new materials or products of better quality)
CC19. Open Category: If an entry does not fit in any of the preceding categories, the Crafts Contest Chairman may place it in the Open Category

GFWC-NC Clubwoman Arts Categories Clubwoman Visual Arts Contest Directions/Submission Requirements

1. Any clubwoman may enter any or all categories.
2. All entries must not have been previously entered in the GFWC-NC Arts Festival on any level.
3. Entries must be no larger than 30 X 40 inches, not including mat. Entries on materials other than canvas must be matted. Only Canvas entries may have a simple frame. OTHERWISE NO GLASS OR FRAMES and will not be accepted.
4. All entrants are limited to non-professionals as defined in the GFWC-NC Arts Festival Rules and Procedures. Earnings from Visual Arts must not exceed \$500 per year.
5. All paintings must be original. The subject matter is the choice of the artist.
6. First, second, and third place ribbons and certificates will be awarded to clubwomen winners in each category.
7. Label entries correctly. Each article must be labeled with an Entry Label (page 10). Affix to back or underside of entry using string or tape with category information facing up.
8. All entries must have been completed within the prior year of the Festival.

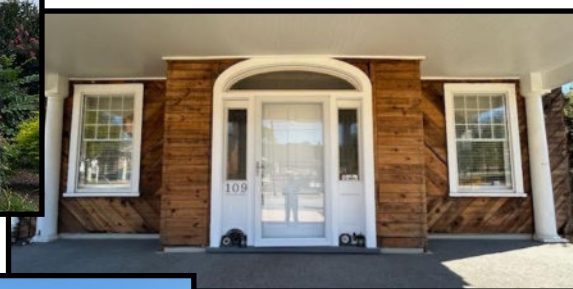

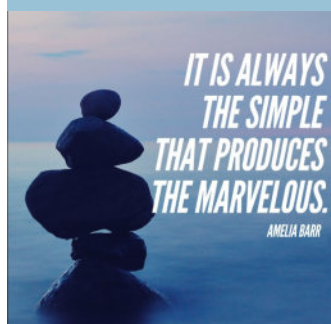

Recipe Corner



Potato Soup for 2

INGREDIENTS

2 slices bacon
1 cup chopped onions
2 cloves garlic
2 cup low sodium chicken broth
2 medium Russet potatoes—peeled & cubed
1 tsp kosher salt
1/2 tsp coarsely ground black pepper
1 cup milk
2 tsp all purpose flour
1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
2 green onions, sliced



DIRECTIONS

In a 2-quart saucepan over medium heat, cook the bacon until crisp. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate to cool, then crumble.

Sauté the onions and garlic in the bacon drippings until softened, about 3 minutes.

Add the broth, potatoes, salt, and pepper. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes, or until the potatoes are tender.

In a small bowl, whisk the milk and flour until smooth. Stir into the soup and bring to a gentle boil. Cook, stirring often, for about 2 minutes, or until thickened.

Remove from heat and stir in the cheese until melted.

Pour into a bowl and top with crumbled bacon & green onions. Serve right away.

Broccoli Salad

INGREDIENTS

Salad Ingredients:

5 cups fresh broccoli florets, cut into small pieces
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup sunflower seeds
1/2 cup cooked, crumbled bacon (I use Real Bacon Bits)
1/2 cup red onion, chopped
1 cup frozen peas, thawed



Dressing Ingredients:

1 cup mayonnaise
2 Tbsp apple cider vinegar
1/2 cup granulated sugar

DIRECTIONS

Combine broccoli florets, raisins, sunflower seeds, bacon bits, chopped onion and peas in a large bowl.

To make dressing: in a separate bowl, whisk together mayonnaise, vinegar, and sugar.

Add the dressing to the salad and toss to mix well.

Chill thoroughly before serving. The broccoli will condense as it sits in the dressing so you may need to drain off the dressing before serving.
