We have made significant academic improvements and there are plans for renovations aimed to address growth and improve our facilities. Principal Stoke thanked the Woman's Club for all we do to support Cooper Academy with our time and talents.



March 6 is National "Slam the Scam" Day. The Social Security Administration (SSA) has designated March 6 as its annual Slam the Scam Day. The day is intended to raise awareness of Social Security-related and other government imposter scams. Keeping informed about these types of scams is the most effective method for deterring cyber criminals. National Slam the Scam Day began in 2020 to educate the public on ways to combat Social Security-related scams. Due to the frequently changing tactics used by scammers, the initiative has since expanded to include other government imposter scams. Slam the Scam Day is held annually as part of the Federal Trade Commission's National Consumer Protection Week, which takes place this year from March 2-8.



The SSA issued a warning on February 11, 2025 about a new scam tactic by criminals trying to lure potential retirement applicants to their site. This recent scam email appears to be from SSA and has the subject line: "Claim Benefits!" It states "Important: Apply for

Your Social Security Benefits Starting in 2025". **THIS EMAIL IS NOT FROM SSA.** Clicking on the link within the email redirects individuals to a fraudulent site.

The SSA is advising to always be cautious of responding to unsolicited emails that appear to be from an official government entity, such as SSA, or another federal agency. These emails are a variation of government imposter scams. **DELETE IT**. Don't click on links or respond to any text, email, phone call, or letter that has characteristics of a scam.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM

Stop talking to the scammer. Notify financial institutions and safeguard accounts.

Report Social Security-related scams to SSA OIG (oig.ssa.gov). Contact local law enforcement and file a police report.

If you lost money, file a complaint with the Federal Bureau of Investigation Internet Crime Complaint Center (ic3.gov).

Report other scams to the Federal Trade Commission (ftc.gov).

Keep financial transaction information and the record of all communications with the scammer.






"Demon Copperhead" by Barbara Kingsolver (book report given by **Ginny Kennerly**)

The rental custodian, **Carrole Dayton**, met with the Clubhouse committee to review proposed updates to the Rental Application and Rental Rules forms.

The Rental Rules were updated to include:

No grills of any type are allowed inside the house or outside on the lawn or gazebo. No smoke bombs/cannons in the house or outside (such as gender reveal bomb/cannons).

The Application was updated to better show the usage either weekday or weekend plus the following changes:

The times of usage was changed to give the Cleanup custodian adequate time to clean the house between usage.

Full day time remains the same – 9 AM to 11 PM

Morning half day hours are now – 9 AM to 3 PM

Evening half day hours are now - 5 PM to 11 PM

Current parties' booked will be grandfathered in with the old times.

HAM DIVAN CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS

2 Tbsp butter

1/2 cup yellow onion, finely diced

1 tbsp olive oil

2.5 cups chicken broth (low sodium)

1 1/4 cup white long grain rice, uncooked

2 cups cooked ham, diced

2 cups broccoli florets

1 10.75 can Cream of Chicken Condensed Soup

1/2 cup sour cream

3/4 cup milk

2.5 cups shredded cheddar cheese, divided

S&P to taste



DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350F Lightly grease a 9x13 baking dish

Melt butter in a large pan over med heat

Add diced onions and cook for 5 minutes, until softened.

Add chicken broth, olive oil, and rice to the pot and bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer.

Cover tightly and cook for 8 minutes.

Add fresh broccoli florets, replace cover and cook for 7 more minutes...refrain from stirring.

Note: if liquid remains in the pot and the rice is not yet cooked through after 15 minutes, cover and simmer for up to 5 additional minutes, or until cooked through.

Remove from heat and leave the cover on. Let the rice sit for 10 minutes. Any rice on the bottom of the pot will release during this time.

Add the diced ham, condensed soup, sour cream, milk, and half of the cheddar cheese. Stir until well combined.

Spread into the prepared casserole dish. Top with remaining cheddar cheese. Cover and bake in preheated oven for about 25 minutes, until heated through and cheese is bubbly (interior temp should be a minimum of 165 degrees). Let casserole sit for 5 minutes before serving.

FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 frozen pie crust
- 1 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 Tbsp cornstarch
- 1 1/4 cup water
- 3 Tbsp strawberry jelly
- 2 cups strawberries, sliced

DIRECTIONS

Bake frozen pie crust according to the package directions. Remove from oven and allow to cool for $10\ \text{minutes}.$

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan over medium heat, whisk together sugar, cornstarch and water. Bring to boil, then reduce heat & simmer for 5 minutes, until thickened.

Whisk in strawberry jelly, Remove from heat and set aside to cool.

Add strawberries in the cooled pie crust, then pour in the jelly mixture. Refrigerate for a few hours until set.
