Town of Clayton Yard Waste Changes

All-Star Waste, the Town's waste collection provider, is phasing out plastic bags for yard waste. Starting October 1, 2025, plastic bags will no longer be allowed for yard waste collection. This change will reduce the number of plastic bags going to the landfill and help keep Clayton cleaner and more sustainable.



Yard Waste Collection Guidelines

Plastic bags are no longer allowed for yard waste

Approved reusable containers include:

Plastic totes

Burlap bags

Canvas bags

Trash cans with a 32-gallon max capacity

Any other reusable container that is properly labeled

Official All-Star Yard Waste Container*

All reusable containers must be labeled "Yard Waste" and include the address number

Limbs and trimmings must continue to follow existing size standards: piles no larger than 6'L x 6'W x 3'H

* Optional All-Star Yard Waste Rollout Cart:

Residents may purchase an official Yard Waste Container from All-Star Waste for a one-time cost of \$85. This cart has a 95-gallon capacity, which is the same size as the current garbage and recycling rollouts. To purchase a container, call or text All-Star at: (919) 989-1562.

Reminder: Loose Leaf Season runs October 1 – January 31. You may still place loose leaves at the curb for vacuum collection.

For questions about waste collection service or approved reusable containers, customers should call or text All-Star Waste at (919) 989-1562.

Environmental Tips:

- 1 Wrap gifts in fabric and tie with ribbon; both are reusable and prettier than paper and sticky-tape.
- 2 Start a compost heap to reduce the waste you send to landfill sites.
- 3 Buy your own hive: without bees the planet would last for only 60 years (and honey is good for your health).
- 4 Slow down. Driving at 50mph uses 25% less fuel than 70mph.
- 5 Wash full loads of clothes instead of wasting water on half-empty loads.
- 6 Turn down your central heating
- 7 Take a brisk shower, not a leisurely bath, to save water.
- 8 Use airtight food containers that can be reused; sandwich bags and plastic wrap cannot.
- 9 Choose energy-efficient appliances when you replace old ones.
- 10 Join a library instead of buying books.

The Municipal Election is right around the corner, happening on November 4th. It's time to make your voice heard and shape the future of our town! Voters are asked to show photo ID when voting in North Carolina. Most voters will simply show their



driver's license, but there are many other acceptable photo IDs. All voters will be allowed to vote with or without a photo ID. For a list of the specific candidates on the ballot, you can look up your sample ballot on the North Carolina State Board of Elections (NCSBE) website.



North Carolina is one of the states that has a special program to honor veterans on Election Day. The **Vote in Honor of a Veteran Program** provides North Carolinians an opportunity to pay tribute to those who have served this country in the Armed Forces. Any voter can honor a veteran on Election Day by requesting a pin.

Pins are provided for free by the State Board of Elections. Each pin can be personalized with the name of the veteran a voter wishes to honor. To request a personalized pin, go to https://www.ncsbe.gov/voting/vote-honor-veteran.

In celebration of the 250th anniversary of the United States of America, we recognize key events during the American Revolution that happened in November 1775. These include the establishment of the Continental Marines and The First Battle of Ninety-Six. The Town of Ninety Six in South Carolina is about 150 miles west of the ocean. Ninety Six proved to be a strategic location during the Revolutionary War, as it was the site of the first land battle in November 1775.














ESO Book Club

Garlic & Herb Mashed Potatoes

INGREDIENTS

4 lbs Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and cubed

1 pkg (8oz) cream cheese, cubed and softened

1/2 cup butter, cubed

1 cup sour cream

1/3 cup heavy whipping cream

3 Tablespoons minced fresh chives

1 Tablespoon minced fresh parsley

3 garlic cloves, minced

1 teaspoon minced fresh thyme

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper



DIRECTIONS

Place potatoes in water to cover in a 6 quart stockpot. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook uncovered until tender, 10-15 minutes. Drain potatoes and return them to the pot. Mash potatoes, gradually adding cream cheese and butter. Stir in remaining ingredients.

Transfer to a greased 3-4 quart slow cooker. Cook, covered, on low to allow flavors to blend, 2-3 hours.

Brussel Sprouts with Bacon

INGREDIENTS

2 pounds Brussel Sprouts, halved

6 bacon strips, chopped

2 Tablespoons olive oil

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

2 Tablespoons balsamic glaze



DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 450. In a large bowl, toss Brussel Sprouts, bacon, oil, salt and pepper. Transfer to a 15x10x1 baking sheet. Roast, stirring halfway through cooking, until sprouts are tender and lightly browned, 20-25 minutes. Drizzle with balsamic glaze. Serve warm.
